

## Heritage panel allows verandah outside Chief Justice courtroom

CHANDIGARH, SEPTEMBER 19

In a significant development, the Chandigarh Heritage Conservation Committee (CHCC) has granted approval for the construction of a verandah in front of court number 1 at the Punjab and Haryana High Court, which serves as the courtroom of the Chief Justice.

The decision was taken during a meeting of the committee chaired by UT Adviser Rajeev Verma.

Currently, verandahs are only constructed in front of court numbers 2 and 9. The newly approved verandah will provide much-needed shelter and convenience to people, particularly during the rainy season.

before the committee, highlighted that the Chandigarh Master Plan had provisions for averandah in front of court number 1. However, this part of the plan was never executed. The verandahs in front of other courtrooms, from court numbers 2 to 9, were constructed along with the original High Court building.

It is the first time that construction work has been sanctioned for the Chief Justice's

Amember of the committee emphasised that before starting the construction, the orig-The proposal, presented inal archive drawings of the building would be thoroughly checked to ensure historical accuracy.

In addition to the verandah, the committee also gave approval to the construction of disabled-friendly washrooms on the premises of the High Court, making it more accessible to all visitors, including those with disabilities.

The Punjab and Haryana High Court building is an integral part of Chandigarh's Capi-

tol Complex, which was designated a World Heritage site by UNESCO in 2016. The Capitol Complex, spread over more than 100 acres in Sector 1, is a masterpiece of modern architecture designed by Le Corbusier. Its iconic structures include the Open Hand Monument, Tower of Shadows, the Legislative Assembly, and the Secretariat, all set against the backdrop of the Shivalik hills.

These new developments aim to preserve the historical integrity of the High Court while also addressing practical needs for modem usage. Recently, the CHCC held discussions on the management of the Capitol Complex. The Management Plan of the Capitol Complex, includes Holistic Development Plan of High Court, expansion of building adjacent to security personnel building near Open Hand Monument; construction of one floor on existing lawyer chamber, iron grill fencing all around the perimeter of the Punjab and Haryana High Court building and segregation of court premises into low and high security zones; and provision of covered verandah in front of court room 1 of the Chief Justice court.

## 'Ceiling covering' wasn't part of Corbusier plan

CHANDIGARH, SEPTEMBER 19 Le Corbusier was apparently not in favour of a "ceiling covering" in front of the Secretariat-facing courtrooms in the Punjab and Haryana High Court, as evident from the Delhi High Court's former Chief Justice Rajinder Sachar's account in the HC's

golden jubilee souvenir. The Chandigarh Heritage Conservation Committee (CHCC) has now granted approval for the construction of a verandah in front of court number 1, which serves as the courtroom of the Chief Justice.

Chief Justice Sachar was virtually of the opinion that trouble poured, along with the rain, for the advocates in Le Corbusier's High Court. But the French architect was determined to not allow his original plan of architecture to be changed. The "verandah" there (in front of courtroom No. 2 to 9 at the same site) was actually completed in Corbusier's absence.

## Gunshots fired at immigration firm office in Dera Bassi

MOHALI, SEPTEMBER 19

Two unidentified youths fired five to six rounds at an immigration-cum-coaching institute in an extortion bid in broad daylight at Dera Bassi this afternoon.

Before fleeing, assailants threw a paper slip demanding one "Khokha" from Harwinder Singh, the owner of Education Point Immigration Services and Consultants. The gunshots were aimed at the main gate of the firm and no one was injured in the incident.

Sources said the threat letter was delivered to the firm on the instructions of Manjit Singh, alias Gurri, of Khedi Gujranwala, currently lodged in Tihar Jail.

The police said apparently it looked like an extortion threat. The forensic team also reached the spot, which is situated around 100 metres from the Dera Bassi police station, to

gather evidence in the case. SSP Deepak Pareek constituted teams to investigate the case.

and the employees have been recorded. "No one has been injured in the incident," he said. This is the second such incident in the past two months. On July 20, shots were fired at a diagnostic laboratory in the main market. Three bike-borne juveniles, students of a government school, claiming allegiance to the Kaushal Chaudhary gang, were arrested later. The trio had entered the Apollo Imaging and Path Lab and handed a threat letter to an employee. After handing the slip, one of them fired in the air before fleeing.—TNS

## Shaheed-e-Azam's statue at airport to be unveiled on Sept 28

MOHALI, SEPTEMBER 19

A 30-ft-high statue of Shaheed-e-Azam Bhagat Singh will be unveiled at the Mohali airport on his birth anniversary on September 28.

The gunmetal statue, in an iconic Bhagat Singh pose, has been installed near the entry of the international airport and is visible from a distance, evoking curosity among the visitors here.

The 6.42-crore project, christened Nishan-E-Inquilab plaza, also includes horticulture, electrical, and civil works by providing red stone pavement, black granite platform, flower pocket, grassing, and lighting.

The median of the entry and the exit road of the airport, measuring 266 ft, is being given final flourishes before the inauguration these days. Besides, two video walls will come up at the site. Officials said the statue was

installed on August 2 and all the work would be completed by September 20. GMADA and the Department of Information and Public Relations are undertaking the development project. The airport was christened

as Shaheed Bhagat Singh International Airport, Chandigarh, on September 25, 2022. Punjab Chief Minister

Bhagwant Singh Mann will dedicate the statue to people on September 28. "Shaheed-e-Azam Bhagat

Singh's statue will also remind the supreme sacrifice made by him to commuters from Haryana, Himachal Pradesh, Uttarakhand, Jammu and Kashmir and other states," he had said recently.

## 19-yr-old killed, 3 hurt | Crossing Sec 62 traffic lights nightmare in rush hour With hospital nearby, ambulances, patients and attendants in vehicles remain stuck in gridlock



MOHALI, SEPTEMBER 19

Traffic congestion near the Sector 62 light point during the daytime has become a bane of commuters. Road users, ambulances, patients and attendants in private vehicles remain stuck here for eternity as a large number of vehicle refuse to budge in times of emergency.

Many a times traffic lights are not functional here, further compounding the problem. Residents complain that a traffic cop was a rare sight here. A resident said repair of a slip road in Sector 62 was hanging fire for several months.

"If the next traffic light is red for a bit longer, two queues of vehicles stretching for almost a km are formed. One can see ambulances and



often turn unruly and way-

come to a private hospital nearby in Sector 62. Serpentine queues of vehicles can be seen here during the moming and evening rush hours. Impatient drivers which has a number of gov-

with vehicles of employees. Residents complain that idling vehicles, app-based taxis, autos and private vehicles congest the area. "During evenings on weekends, the crowd is unruly. It not only disturbs the free flow of the vehicles but also increases the risk

of accidents," they said.

"So many road accidents take place at the busy junctions in the heart of the city. Haphazard parking on roads in market areas and lax enforcement of traffic rules are also to blame for frequent road mishaps," said Nidhi Tyagi, a Phase VIII resident who crosses this junction twice a day during rush hours.

"What does it take to ensure that traffic lights are functional during peak hours," Darshan Singh Kalra, a Sector 71 resident, asks Mohali traffic police.

Traffic police officials said they try their best to keep the flow of vehicles unhindered near the hospital area. "Challaning drive is carried out on regular basis. A PCR is stationed round the clock in the area. People should also drive responsibly," said DSP City2 Harsimran Singh Bal.

## Chain snatchers target teacher near school

## Year on, proclamation notice issued to two in extortion case

MOHALI, SEPTEMBER 19

A special NIA court here has issued a proclamation notice to gangster Harpreet Singh, alias Happy Singh Passia, a resident of Passia village in Amritsar and Ramandeep Singh Judge, a resident of Ferozepur, in a UAPA and Arms Act case.

Passia reportedly funded the accused in the Chandigarh blast case.

The NIA registered a case regarding their involvement in the supply of weapons for extortion from businessmen on July 10, 2023. The court noted that the duo had been shown as absconders in the case. Passia and Ramandeep are

required to appear in the court till September 26 or within 30 days from the date of the issue of the proclamation notice.

Canada-based Khalistani terrorist Lakhbir Singh Landa, Sandhu, alias weapon supplier Baljeet Singh of Barwani (MP), Gurpreet Singh Gopi and Satnam Singh Satta were the main accused in the case.Baljeet and Gurpreet Singh were arrested, while Landa and Satta are said to be based in Canada. -TNS

## 'Ceiling covering' ...

"The courtrooms facing the Secretariat would, in the rainy season, get windy showers. We had to frequently put on raincoats and certainly carry umbrellas before entering the courtrooms," says Chief Justice Sachar. "The Bar tried several times to convince Corbusier to have a ceiling covering (like the existing one) to prevent the windy rain coming in, but he steadfastly refused.... His attitude was that of a knight in armour challenging the gods. He assumed that the weather gods would change its windy rain. But Corbusier would not allow his original plan of architecture to be changed, whatever inconveniences may follow".

Chief Justice Sachar goes on to say a "kind of benevolent conspiracy was hatched between the lawyers and the local engineers". It was resolved to complete the verandah the next time he went to Paris. 'It was similar to our usual strategy, when we advise clients to delay the hearing of the case, if the matter is fixed before an inconvenient judge, who we know is shortly going on leave. Of course, Corbusier on his return was enraged and fuming, but the mischief had been done, so he was possibly reconciled unwillingly".

Chief Justice Sachar was also a member of United Nations Sub-Commission on the Promotion and Protection of Human Rights and served as a counsel for the People's Union for Civil Liberties. He also chaired the Sachar Committee, constituted by the Government of India, which submitted a report on the social, econom-

ic and educational status of

Muslims in India. Designed by Le Corbusier, the High Court started functioning at Chandigarh from its present building in January 1955. It features a distinctive rhythmic arcade, sheltered by a parasol-like roof that casts a protective shade over the entire structure.

"Keeping in view the special dignity of the Judges, Le Corbusier created a special entrance for them through a high portico resting on three giant pylons painted in bright colours. Very much in the tradition of the Buland Darwaza of Fatehpur Sikri, this grand entrance with its awesome scale is intended to manifest the Majesty of the Law to all who enter," says the High Court website.

He recently met Congress leader and former Panchkula Mayor Upinder Ahluwalia to seek votes.

Gian Chand Gupta, accompanied by party leaders Banto Kataria, BB Singhal, May-Kulbhushan Goyal, Ranjita Mehta, and others went around seeking votes in Sector 15, Chandi Kotla, Sector 10 and Billa, Jaswantgarh, Tibba, Kanoli and Naggal villages, among other areas.

He said the BJP's 'sankalp patra' (election manifesto) was one, which fulfilled the aspirations of the people. He said the BJP's manifesto was a pledge the state's development.

Gupta said their manifesto

## 147 apply to vote from home in P'kula

PANCHKULA, SEPTEMBER 19 A total of 147 elderly and disabled persons have applied to cast votes from home. District Election Officer Yash Garg said their votes would be collected by a team of the returning officer. He said according to the Election Commission of India, people above 85 years of age andthose with more than 40 per cent disability were allowed to vote from home. For this, they have to file applications under form 12-D.

5,556 voters in the age group of above 85 year in the district. Out of these, 2,303 were in Kalka Assembly and 3,253 in Panchkula Assembly segment. There were 166 voters in the age group of more than 100 years, out of which 84 were in Kalka Assembly and 82 in Panchkula Assembly segment. Also, there were 2,472 divyang voters in the district -1,218 in Kalka and 1,254 in Panchkula. There were 303 blind voters in the district, 145 in Kalka and 158 in Panchkula.

## Permission mandatory for advertisements: DC

District Election Officer Yash Garg today said permission from the Media Certification & Monitoring Committee (MCMC) was mandatory to run advertisements in cinema halls, cable and newspapers. "All cable operators have to ensure compliance with the Cable TV Network Regulation Act, including the rules pre-

scribed by the EC. Strict action will be taken against those who violate orders," he said.

Only certified advertisements will be broadcast he said, adding: "The certificate issued by the committee will have the seal and signature of the competent officer concerned. The operator has to take care that only CDs bearing the seal should be played as advertisement," he said. -TNS

## Closed since 2018, Kalka girls school in a shambles

PANCHKULA, SEPTEMBER 19 The lack of a management

committee and internal politics has left an age-old girls school in Kalka in complete shambles as it has remained shut for six years. Trees and bushes have grown out of the school, which was the only government-aided school for girls in the city. The property that has over 40 classrooms and science labs has been shut since 2018.

The Hindu Girls Senior Secondary School, Sohan Nagar,

Kalka, was opened in 1918. Run by a management committee made up of the area's residents with government aid, the school was gradually upgraded to the senior secondary level and also provided coaching for BA and BEd courses for a few years. But as of today, the school


