



'Working weekend' comes to naught

- Govt unable to muster numbers to pass constitutional amendment
- Attempts to build consensus at special parliamentary committee meeting do not bear fruit as govt fails to convince Fazl
- Sunday sittings of both houses adjourned with no business being transacted; cabinet expected to okay 'Constitutional Package' today ahead of National Assembly, Senate sessions

ISLAMABAD: A controversial Constitutional Package, which had remained under wraps for months could not be tabled in parliament even on Sunday, despite best efforts from the ruling coalition, as it failed to muster the two-thirds support required for the passage of a constitutional amendment.

The day-long ambiguity surrounding the Constitutional Package finally ended on Friday, as both houses of parliament briefly convened at noon following multiple postponements, only to be adjourned until Monday morning (today).

The Senate will now meet at 11:30am, whereas the National Assembly has been summoned to meet at 12:30pm on Monday. However, as per procedure, the constitutional amendment first needs to be cleared by the federal cabinet, which is also expected to convene on Monday.

Although it usually meets on Tuesday, the cabinet meeting has been shifted to the Eid MiladunNabi (PMU) holiday on Tuesday.

However, observers believe this may open a door for judicial intervention, which the government had hoped to avoid by putting in extra effort on an official holiday.

The proposed set of amendments, which had been kept out of the public eye, much to the chagrin of the opposition as well as government allies, was eventually discussed at the special parliamentary committee's meeting in a bid to take the opposition on board.

This meeting, which was also attended by a representative of the opposition PTI, was convened after the government seemingly failed to convince its former ally Maulana Fazlur Rehman to vote for the amendment on Sunday.

Disappointment writ large

It was apparent that the deadlock that prevails before the special committee meeting continued to prevail as following the end of the meeting — after midnight — most participants emerged with long and bagged faces.

Committee chairperson Syed Khursheed Shah told reporters that the draft of the proposed constitutional amendment had not been shared with Maulana Fazlur Rehman's party as it had yet to be okayed by the cabinet and

could not be shared before that.

The Maulana also seemed unhappy, though he did not talk about the issue in detail, he did say it is a sensitive issue which should be discussed calmly."

PTI's Omar Ayub and Barrister Ali Zafar also complained that no draft was presented in the meeting, which lasted nearly three hours.

"They [the government] have no draft with them and they did not know what to discuss,"


In the lead-up to the meeting of the special committee, Parliament Lodges and the residence of the opposition as well as government allies, was eventually discussed at the special parliamentary committee's meeting in a bid to take the opposition on board.

The emphasis of the government seemed to be on securing the magic number required for the passage of the amendment — 234 in the case of the National Assembly and 64 in the Senate. But despite all claims that it had "completed its homework", the government's reluctance to table the amendment on Sunday night belied its earlier claims of having the members to pass the amendment through both houses.

Everything seems to be riding on the support of Maulana — sources said the late-night decision to get off the session of both houses of parliament was taken on his insistence — as he holds the key to bringing the government closer to their goal as far as the Senate is concerned.

With his five seats in the Senate, the Maulana is in a position to tip the scales in the

Fazl — the quintessence of a dealmaker

- JUI-F chief's residence becomes political hub as govt, opposition try to win his support

ISLAMABAD: The residence of Maulana Fazlur Rehman saw the most political activity on Sunday — even eclipsing the level of politicking going on at parliament — as both the government and the opposition attempted to

win the support of the politically astute JUI-F chief.

So considerable is his clout that events began unfolding at Parliament House in earnest only after his arrival on the premises. After a day filled with political meetings, the Maulana made his way to a meeting of the special committee — chaired by PPP's Syed

Khusro Shah — that was formed a few days ago to deliberate over the issue of the constitutional amendments being proposed.

While there was no official word on what transpired during the committee meeting, which was underway at the

Vaccinators under fire

The low and order situation in the two provinces makes polio workers a frequent target for militants.

Since 2012, 126 persons have

been killed and 201 injured in attacks targeting healthcare workers and officials of the polio programme. In one of the most high-profile attacks, Dr Abdul Rehman, a polio programme official, was killed in Sajau earlier this year.

"In each [protectionist] drive, our colleagues die and get injured," said Shabir Ali Bhatti, a body health worker.

The modus operandi of militants is simple, Ali Bhatti said, adding that in most cases two assailants on a motorbike attack vaccinators and flee the scene.

Ali Bhatti, 24, tells Dawn that the frequency of attacks means that health workers are "always

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Petrol cut by Rs10, diesel by Rs13 a litre

ISLAMABAD: For the fourth fortnight in a row, the government on Sunday slashed prices of petrol and high-speed diesel (HSD) by around Rs10 and Rs13.06 per litre, respectively, with immediate effect till Sept 30, mainly because of lower international market.

The government also cut light diesel and kerosene oil prices by Rs12.12 and Rs11.15 per litre, respectively.

In a two-night announcement, the Ministry of Finance and Ogra had worked out the consumer prices of petroleum products, based on the price variations in the international market. As such, the ex-depot prices of both petrol and diesel have slipped below Rs250 per litre mark.

The ex-depot petrol price was thus cut to Rs249.10 for the next fortnight from Rs259.10 per litre, down by 3.96ps (Rs3.06 per litre). In the retail market, petrol would, however, be available at around Rs250 per litre.

On the other hand, the ex-depot price of HSD was slashed by Rs13.06

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Top lawyers oppose PTI 'made all-out efforts' to stop amendment constitutional amendment bill

Muneer Malik urges CJP Isa to retire on Oct 25

LAHORE: Senior lawyers have reacted sharply to the proposed constitutional package and called upon Chief Justice of Pakistan Qazi Fazl to stay away from the controversy.

In a statement on Sunday, Muneer A. Malik and Faizul Nadiq, advocates Supreme Court, urged CJP Isa to relinquish his robes with honour on Oct 25, 2024, and said that Justice Syed Mansoor Ali Shah will deservedly be the true CJP on the date of Oct 26.

They also asked CJP Isa not to be a witness for any appointment for any proposed constitutional court or bench.

They recalled that they had acted either as counsels for CJP Isa, or publicly supported him through their writings against the unconstitutional and malevolent presidential reference filed against their Justice Isa.

They called the government move an unprecedented assault on the Constitution and Supreme Court and the High Courts through a dubious and questionable constitutional amendments package.

Amendments made to the Constitution do not fit in the domain of a parliament that lacks national legitimacy, they said, adding, "We therefore urge the legal fraternity and the judiciary to resist and reject them".

Meanwhile, Supreme Court Bar Association (SCBA) president Shehzad Sharif expressed surprise as to why the government is putting so much effort on the constitutional package and not bringing it to the designated forums for proper discussion, making the whole nation speculate on the issue.

In a statement, he pointed out that the

SCRA is unlikely to oppose the proposed amendment if it is related only to the institution of a constitutional court which, he says, is necessary to check the unusual delay in the adjudication of cases of common people only because the Supreme Court is mostly engaged in hearing of cases of political nature.

He recalled that even PTI leaders Imran Khan and JUI-F senior Maulana Fazlur Rehman were signatories to the Charter of Democracy in 2006 that had called for setting up the Federal Constitutional Court. However, he declared, they would resist if the government tried to enhance the retirement age of judges or made any person-specific constitutional amendment as the Supreme Court had already declared null and void person-specific legislation.

Senior lawyer Khurram Chughtai said the nation is set to experience the era of "constitutional patchwork" done through the 18th Amendment which was discussed by senior jurists and parliamentarians of various parties for a whole year before it was introduced, while the incoming government is making "more serious" efforts to introduce another constitutional package drafted by the likes of Tariq.

"At a time when parliament is incomplete because of reserved seats issue and results of elections of many constituencies are controversial, a government that cannot even appoint law secretary despite the Supreme Court orders is attempting to pass a constitutional amendment, which has far-reaching effects without a thorough discussion on it in the house committees and other forums," he regretted.

Asad Jamal, another lawyer, said if election to the highest constitutional office of presidency could be held by the same "incomplete" parliament, then there was no harm in getting the constitutional amendment passed by the same house.

Party leaders try to prevail on Maulana Fazl not to lend support to govt; family claims south Punjab MNA 'missing'

ISLAMABAD: The main opposition party, Pakistan Tehreek-e-Insaf (PTI), on Sunday had one of its most hectic days after the July 8 elections, as it made "all possible efforts" to stop the government from introducing a controversial constitutional amendment.

The party's efforts, which began early in the day, culminated in Barrister Ghous Ali Khan's participation in the meeting of a special committee chaired by PPP's Syed Khurshid Shah at the National Assembly late on Sunday night.

Earlier in the day, the party focused its efforts on winning over Maulana Fazlur Rehman, with several key leaders meeting the JUI-F

clerk for over an hour.

Footage of party leaders offering prayers with the JUI-F chief was also broadcast by channels.

Party sources said efforts were being made to ensure that no PTI legislator attended the Senate and National Assembly sittings.

However, the party's high command said some legislators were not reachable and efforts were being made to contact and con-

vince the JUI-F to not ask for temporary benefits.

He said if government would have been sincere about the legislation it would not have kept the proposed amendment a secret.

He warned the proposed legislation would only damage the reputation of the judiciary.

Harriner Muhammad Ali Sood, the spokesperson of the KP government, said such an amendment would constitute a clear case of sedition, as it was an "attack on the apex court".

'Missing' MNA

Separately, PTI MNA Ahsan ul Khichi's family claimed he has been "missing" for several days.

According to Khichi's family sources, MNA Ahsan ul Khichi has not been in contact with them.

The issue was raised in the Senate a day earlier by party leader Shabbir Farooq, who accused the ruling coalition of pressuring his party's lawmakers in a bid to get their votes in favour of the constitutional amendments bill.

The inescapable irony of Democracy Day

KARACHI: The country marked International Day of Democracy on Sunday with a flurry of unprecedented political activity in the capital, with leaders from across the political spectrum scrapping together support for, or shoring up opposition to, a government-sponsored constitutional amendment.

However, top state functionaries and senior government figures in their messages reiterated their unwavering commitment to the Constitution, democracy and rule of law.

"Our government's commitment to constitutionalism, democracy,

rule of law and human rights is firm and unswerving. Adherence to these democratic values is our calling as a nation," Prime Minister Shehbaz Sharif said in his message.

The prime minister called for continuing the efforts to build a more inclusive, just, and equal world for all.

"Together, we can strengthen the foundations of democracy and ensure that it serves as a beacon of hope and progress for future generations," he added.

In his message, President Asif Ali Zardari mentioned the importance of democracy in engendering citizens and promoting their active participation in the political process.

He said democracy stood as the cornerstone of a just society, advocating for the protection of fundamental rights and ensuring political, economic and social inclusion.

"We also recognise the role that our Parliament plays in safeguarding democracy by representing the will of the people, formulating public policy, and addressing the nation's most pressing challenges. It is the primary forum for addressing grievances, ensuring inclusivity, and charting a resilient future for Pakistan," the president said.

Separately, while speaking about the constitutional amendment set to be tabled in parliament, Information Minister Ahsanullah Tarar said that each and every pro-

vision of the proposed legislation was being perused carefully.

Besides, legal experts' opinions were being sought at every provision to ensure that all aspects were taken into consideration thoroughly.

The minister said the government and its allies were already engaged in discussions, while Maulana Fazl was consulting opposition parties on the draft amendment. Legal experts from all parties are involved in this process as their opinions hold significant weight, he added. Today is a democracy day in Pakistan and this is the beauty of democracy that all parties are part of this consultative process, he remarked.

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Operation conducted against seven illegal housing schemes

RAWALPINDI: On the recommendation of the Divisional Intelligence Committee, the Joint Task Force of the district administration, local police and Rawalpindi Development Authority (RDA) conducted an operation against seven unauthorised housing schemes and demolished main gates, site offices, boundary walls, barriers and removed containers and land plotting markers.

According to the RDA spokesman, the team executed an operation targeting seven illegal housing schemes - Pak PWD Housing Scheme, Agro Park Housing Scheme, Green Lake City, River Marketing, Atta Farms, CII Valley and Organic Meadows.

These schemes are located in Muzaffar Bagga, Shakhsar, Faizia Qurban, Kuri Khuda Bakhsh, Bawali, Jajja to Budhuwal Road, Netha Dola and Basanta in the tribal and district of Rawalpindi.

He said the operation was supervised by Commissioner Aslam Khan, along with Deputy Commissioner Dr Hassan Waqar Cheema, RDA Director General Kinza Murza and City Police Officer Khalid Hamdan.

RDA Director General Kinza Murza stated that, under the commissioner's guidance, the crackdown on illegal housing societies would continue vigorously to prevent fraud and protect citizens from exploitation.

She emphasised that public complaints regarding illegal land occupation by housing scheme owners were being taken seriously, and strict actions would be taken against those involved in forceful land grabs.

"The RDA consistently issues information for the public and advises to avoid investing in illegal housing schemes. The public is encouraged to visit the RDA website ([www.rda.gov.pk](http://rda.gov.pk)) and only engage with approved housing schemes," she added.

Despite previous warnings to cease illegal advertisements, bookings and development activities, the owners of the above mentioned housing schemes continued to operate booking offices in violation of regulations.

On the other hand, the district administration on Sunday razed illegal sheds of shops and commercial buildings on Adiala Road and warned traders in other markets to remove illegal structures otherwise stern action would be taken against them.

According to the district administration spokesman, the district land revenue department conducted the survey and identified permanent structures to clear 65 feet right of way of main road.

He said final notices were issued to the illegal building owners, asking them to vacate voluntarily as illegal structures would be razed.

He said 65 feet from both sides of the road would be cleared and in this regard, the Punjab government had given a go-ahead signal to the administration. He said the provincial government was asked to clear the roads and remove hurdles in the smooth flow of traffic and provide easy access to pedestrians.

He said the Punjab government also made a plan to spend Rs2.65 billion to reconstruct Adiala Road from Kutchery Chowk to Adiala jail in the next fiscal year.

"Adiala Road is an important access road to the mega Ring Road project. Plans are being worked out to make it wide and signal free," he added.—Staff Reporter

Metro rehabilitation project inches forward

Track outside two stations fixed, eight more to go; feeder buses for Pindi to arrive in November

RAWALPINDI: The authorities have completed the rehabilitation of the bus corridor outside two metro stations as a part of a project to rehabilitate the elevated track by the end of December.

The Rawalpindi Development Authority (RDA) divided the corridor into 20 sites - two each for a bus station - under the "Rehabilitation of Metro Corridor from Sadiq to Faisalabad" project costing Rs18.945 million.

An RDA official said the work would be completed by December, adding that both sides of the Sadiqabad and

Rehmanabad bus stations have been completed. Similarly, one side of the Waris Khan and Liaquat Bagh stations had also been completed.

According to the official, the rehabilitation of the metro corridor and the platforms was a complicated process. He said during the day buses run on a single track while the workers carried out renovations work on the other track. After completing all 20 sites, the road will be re-carpeted from Sadiq to Faisalabad.

The official appeared confident that work would end by December, saying the contractor had been given six months to complete the task.

"Mostly the work is done at night, from 11 pm till morning however," he said.

The RDA official said there was also need to repair the track and platforms on the metro bus stations. However, he said that the repair work was limited to the metro track and there was no plan for the renovation of bus stations in this project.

"For the safety of buses and passengers, security guards are deployed on the track to manage the buses on one lane which is opened to traffic," he said.

He said that all measures had been adopted to make the journey of passengers comfortable during the construction work and it did not reduce the number of passengers. However, he said that the speed of buses did reduce due to the ongoing works.

It may be mentioned here that the project completed in 2014 and the federal and Punjab governments almost equally shared the Rs44.8 billion project cost. Of it the Rawalpindi section cost Rs19.17 billion and the Islamabad section Rs25.64 billion.

The total length of the metro corridor is approximately 23km, including 8km elevated, 1km at grade, and four-kilometre trials.

The portion of Metro Bus Service in Rawalpindi from Thakher's Hotel to Faisalabad having distance of 8km is elevated, while in Islamabad 16-km is

on ground, starting from Faisalabad to Park Secretariat via I.J.P. Road and 10th Avenue. The track has 24 modern stations for the passengers. Of these 10 are on Merewa Road while 14 are in Islamabad. Sixty-eight air-conditioned buses for the service are being operated and transport an estimated 150,000 passengers daily.

On the other hand, Punjab government will launch 502 buses in the garrison city on 10 routes to connect different parts of the city with its current metro bus station.

"The feeder buses will connect all parts of the city with existing metro bus route. The routes of the buses designed to people from Peshawar Road, Adiala Road and other areas will catch the buses at Islamabad without any problem," said Regional Transport Authority Secretary Rashed Ali.

He said that the process of the buses arrival in Rawalpindi would likely to complete by November.

Surge in dengue cases in Pindi sparks urgent response

RAWALPINDI: The city's three government hospitals are grappling with a continuous influx of dengue patients, as 32 new cases were reported on Sunday, pushing the total number of dengue cases this season to 374.

The alarming rise in cases in September has prompted urgent measures by the Punjab government to prevent further spread of the mosquito-borne disease.

A large number of dengue patients were reported in Holy Family Hospital, Banarsi Bhutto Hospital and District Headquarters Hospital.

On Sunday alone, 237 patients were admitted to these hospitals. Among them, 32 tested positive for dengue fever, with 26 dengue patients landing in Holy Family Hospital, 34 in Banarsi Bhutto Hospital and 34 at the District Headquarters Hospital.

All the patients in those

government-run hospitals arrived from 70 union councils of the city and 10 wards of Rawalpindi and the Chaklala Cantt Board.

A senior doctor at Banarsi Bhutto Hospital reported that the hospital currently had 334 patients admitted and could accommodate over 600 at a time. Six dengue patients were discharged on Sunday after receiving treatment.

The doctor expressed cautious optimism that the number of cases might decrease in the coming month, though the current period remains critical.

"The district administration, led by Deputy Commissioner Dr Hassan Waqar Cheema, is working day and night to clear the city and cantonment from the dengue virus," said a senior official of the district administration.

He said that a third-party audit conducted by the Agriculture and Local Government departments is ongoing to evaluate the effectiveness of the anti-dengue measures and the performance of sanitary patrols.

Chak Jabbalan and Katha Kalan union councils of the garrison city have been designated as sensitive areas due to the high number of cases.

However, the majority of patients have been reported from Gillian Colony, Margot, Airport Housing Society and New Afzal Town near Gujranwala.

To address the outbreak, rescue operations are scheduled for 12 Rabab Awali. However, it has been decided that no anti-dengue activities will be conducted along the routes of Eid Milad processions in the city and cantonment areas.

Three murdered, man drowns in nullah

RAWALPINDI: Three people were killed while a man drowned in a nullah on Sunday, police and emergency services said.

The emergency service said a group of friends had gone to a nullah near Judicial Town Baroda for bathing where one of them drowned. The emergency services said the body was fished out and shifted to the THQ hospital Marwan. The victim was yet to be identified.

Tariq Mohamed told Waris Khan police that his brother, Dildar, left his house but did not return. Later, his motorcycle was found parked outside a hotel.

He said they were informed that a body had been shifted to hospital by Waris Khan police. The relatives contacted the police which led to identification of Dildar. He said there were knife and dagger wounds on his body.

Nasim Saeed lodged an FIR with Sadiqabad police saying that his brother Muftiullah ran a barber shop. He said he received a call that his brother had been taken by one Abdullah and an unidentified person to their room in the area and strangled.

He said later he found his brother's body lying in the mortuary of the District Headquarters Hospital. The motive behind the murder was old enmity.

Another murder case was reported to Nasirabad police by Asim Masih. He said his two brothers and his father were standing in the street. He said his father exchanged his words with Nauman Manzil alias Cheema following which Samson went inside his house and came out with a pistol and shot his father.

The complainant said he shifted his father to the THQ hospital where he died.—Mohammed Anghar

WHO calls for better diagnosis on World Patient Safety Day

ISLAMABAD: "World Patient Safety Day" will be observed on September 17 (Tuesday), to raise public awareness and foster collaboration between patients, healthcare workers, policymakers, and healthcare leaders to enhance patient safety.

This year's theme, "Improving Diagnosis for Patient Safety", with the slogan "Get it Right, Make it Safe!", underscores the vital importance of accurate and timely diagnosis in ensuring patient safety and improving health outcomes.

The World Health Organisation (WHO), through its slogan, urges concerted efforts to significantly reduce diagnostic errors by adopting multifaceted interventions. These efforts should be grounded in systems thinking, human factors, and the active involvement of patients, their families, health workers, and healthcare leaders.

The interventions include: ensur-

ing thorough patient history assessments, comprehensive clinical examinations, improving access to diagnostic tests, implementing methods to track and learn from diagnostic errors, and adopting technology-driven solutions.

A diagnosis identifies a patient's health issue and is key to accessing the necessary care and treatment. Diagnostic errors, which include delayed, incorrect, or missed diagnoses, or the failure to communicate them, can have serious implications for patient safety.

Improving diagnostic safety requires addressing both systemic issues and cognitive factors that contribute to errors. Systemic factors include organisational vulnerabilities like communication breakdowns among health team workers, or between workers and patients, excessive workloads, and poor teamwork. Cognitive factors relate to clinician training, experience, and predisposition to biases, fatigue, and stress.

One of the key objectives of World

Patient Safety Day 2024 is to empower patients and their families to actively engage with healthcare professionals and leaders to enhance diagnostic processes. It also aims to prioritise diagnostic safety in patient safety policies and clinical practices at all levels of healthcare, in alignment with the Global Patient Safety Action Plan (2021–2030).

The "Global Patient Safety Action Plan" emphasises the importance of safe diagnostic practices and encourages countries to adopt strategies that reduce diagnostic errors. These often stem from a combination of cognitive and systemic factors, affecting the recognition of patients' key symptoms and the interpretation of test results.

The scale of diagnostic errors is significant, accounting for nearly 10% of preventable harm within health systems. With most adults likely to experience at least one diagnostic error in their lifetime, substantial efforts are needed to improve the safety and accuracy of diagnostic processes.



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'Over 90pc coverage' as polio drive concludes

ISLAMABAD: As the week-long campaign against polio concluded on Sunday, the data of first six days showed that 97 per cent target of vaccination has been achieved. The data from the last day will be compiled on Monday.

The campaign was launched by Prime Minister Shehbaz Sharif on Sept 9 in 115 districts of the country to vaccinate 30 million children under the age of five.

Some 286,000 polio workers went door-to-door to administer polio drops to children.

Prime Minister's Coordinator for Health Dr Matik Mughal Shahzad said that as of September 14, as many as 97% of the children have been vaccinated in 115 districts, adding that the catch-up activities have also commenced and they are meant to ensure that no child is left unvaccinated.

In a statement, he appreciated efforts of polio teams on who delivered the vaccine house-to-home despite many challenges.

He directed the national polio programme team to review the post-campaign results and prepare detailed plans to plug the identified gaps ahead of the next campaign in October.

Mohammad Ahsan Illyas, the coordinator of the National Emergency Operations Centre for Polio Eradication, said that the campaign faced challenges in southern Khyber Pakhtunkhwa that needed to be addressed, while the drive in Balochistan progressed well.

Alarm over rise in bringing kids to sit-ins

Child protection body seeks action against culprits behind such 'exploitation'

QUETTA: The Balochistan Child Protection Commission has expressed serious concern over the increasing trend of "using children as human shields" in political protests and sit-ins.

The commission said the exploitation of children in this manner constitutes a grave violation of their rights, putting

their safety and protection at serious risk.

"This exploitation undermines their right to protection and security, as outlined in national legislation and Article 19 of the United Nations Convention on the Rights of the Child," it stated.

The commission had recommended that the government take stringent actions against those responsible according to the relevant laws, to ensure the protection and welfare of children.

Additionally, it urged all political and social organisations to avoid involving minors in any form of protest or activity that could jeopardise their safety and integrity.

time of going to press, brief remarks by JUI-F's Chaudhry Haideri hinted at what the party's stance might be.

Speaking to reporters on Sunday night, he said the party would participate in the National Assembly session scheduled to be held later in the night, but would not support any amendment as the draft had not been shared with their party.

"Our point of view is clear, we cannot make any decision about the constitutional amendment, as the draft has not been shared with us — how can we make a decision without even reading it," Chaudhry Haideri said.

But responding to the statement, Barrister Aqeel Malik, who is the federal government's spokesperson on legal affairs, said that the law minister had briefed parliamentarians on the proposed amendment.

"Maybe the bill in its actual copy was not in Mr Chaudhry's hand but the Law Minister has briefed lawmakers on the proposed amendment," Barrister Aqeel clarified.

Political goings-on

After his meetings with the government and opposition representatives on Friday and Saturday, the Maslana began Sunday with a meeting with PPP leader Bilawal Bhutto Zardari.

Then, around 3pm after a JUI-F parliamentary party meeting at the

residence of the party chief, JUI-F's Secretary General Allama Riazuddin Saeedrao issued a statement that seemed to signal the party's willingness to listen to the government's views.

In the statement, Mr Saeedrao said that the JUI-F was in favour of establishing a separate constitutional court in the Supreme Court would focus on public issues and public interest cases.

"It helps in clearing the pending cases before the Supreme Court at a fast pace and provides relief to the public, the number of judges in the apex court has to be increased," Allama Saeedrao said.

"If there is any such legislation, JUI-F will have no hesitation to be part of it," the statement concluded.

Subsequently, a government team comprising Deputy Prime Minister Ishaq Dar, Law Minister Arsen Naseer, Tariq Mehmood Minister Momin Nasir visited the JUI-F chief.

Then the opposition delegation led by PTI Chairman Barrister Ghulam Ali Khan visited the residence of Maslana Farhanuddin and even offered evening prayers led by the JUI-F chief.

Offices on the table

Although there was no official word on what was discussed behind closed doors, insiders told DAWN that PTI had supposedly offered the PML-N's Asad Mehmood a seat in

the National Assembly, encouraging him to join what the party terms as "popular movement for restoration of true democracy in country".

JUI-F sources indicated that two of the Maslana's demands included governance in KP provinces and a seat in parliament for his son Asad, apart from some space in the federal cabinet.

The PPP has reportedly offered to have Asad elected as a senator from Sindh.

Sources close to Balochistan lawmakers confided that Interior Minister Mohsin Naqvi has offered the JUI-F chief the slot of Balochistan chief minister in return for his support, as well as the possibility that Asad Mehmood could become an MPAs from that province.

The importance of winning over the Maslana can be gauged from the fact that Interior Minister Mohsin Naqvi was involved in the negotiation process on Sunday. He wasn't the only one, however, and former Senate chairman Sadiq Sanjrani also appeared to the government in acting as a bridge.

Then, later at night, Balochistan Chief Minister Sardar Shahzad and former prime minister Asmaud Haq Kalakai also appeared in Parliament House and joined a meeting between the Maslana and government representatives in Mr Naqvi's chamber.

On Sunday, the price of petrol has risen to Rs249.69 per litre for next 15 days.

The government also announced Rs11.15 and Rs12.12 per litre cut in the price of kerosene oil and in the octane price of light diesel to Rs158.47 and Rs141.73 per litre, respectively.

Informed sources said the prices of petrol and HSD decreased in the international market by more than \$5 per barrel in the last fortnight.

Officials said the average price of petrol had dropped in the international market to about \$75 per barrel from about \$82 per barrel. The HSD also declined to about \$82 per barrel from \$88.2 in the last fortnight. During the current fortnight, the import premium on petrol and HSD remained generally stable at \$8.5 and \$5 per barrel, respectively. On the other hand, the exchange rate remained range-bound.

On the last pricing review with effect from September 8, the government had reduced the petrol and HSD prices by Rs11.86 and Rs1.32 per litre, respectively. Thus, the total reduction in petrol and HSD prices in last fortnight has amounted to Rs26.50 and Rs2.94 per litre, respectively.

The prices of petrol and HSD had witnessed an increase of Rs17.44 and Rs1.24 per litre, respectively in the month of July. Earlier between May 1 and June 15, the prices of both petrol and HSD had been reduced by about Rs6.94 per litre and Rs2.22 per litre, respectively.

At present, the government is charging about Rs2 per litre tax on both petrol and HSD. Although, general sales tax in excess of 11% on petroleum products, the government is charging Rs60 per litre PDU on both products that normally impact the masses.

Political drama

IT fell to the Maryland to save the day. With a constitutional amendment in the balance and powerful individuals repeatedly knocking on his door, Maryland Speaker Rahman, chief of his own faction of the Jamaat Ulema-Islam, broke the deadlock late Sunday when he made it clear that he would not support any extension in the tenure of senior judges. This is one of the many controversial changes the government reportedly plans to make through its constitutional package, the details of which are still wrapped in mystery. Given that the JUI-F chief, even with his few votes, could have tipped the scales in favour of or against the amendments, both the government and opposition made all-out efforts to win him over. In the end, his position, stated late on Sunday during a special parliamentary committee's fourth meeting of the day, forced the government to drop its plans.

As news announcements began breaking the news late last night, signalling a much-needed intermission to a political drama that has kept the nation on edge, it seemed like a fitting conclusion to the International Day of Democracy, which, incidentally, was also being observed yesterday. Despite all that has transpired over the past few years and the many valid criticisms of

Pakistan's flawed political system, it was heartening to see that the country's burning political issues can still be settled through old-fashioned dialogue and negotiation. The speaker's position was underlined by his insistence on major decisions being taken through consultation and negotiation instead of bulldozing them through parliament. Further, while the government ultimately could not move its desired legislation according to the plan, the opposition offered it an olive branch. It suggested that its proposals be debated more thoroughly and given more time; it even offered conditional support for a suggestion to set up a constitutional court.

As matters stand, there is an opportunity for the chief justice to step away with grace from the controversies surrounding his tenure. While some of his decisions may have sparked debate, Chief Justice Qazi Fazl Jilani has had an enviable career and earned much honour. The best course of action for him would be to voluntarily step down and ensure that any amendments that affect the judiciary take effect once he retires next month. In doing so, he will not only safeguard the independence of his office but also set a good precedent for future transitions. Meanwhile, the government must revisit its plans. It should ensure that any proposed changes to the judiciary are subjected to thorough debate and consensus before implementation. Creating a constitutional court is a step worth exploring, but influencing the elevation and transfer of judges is not. Given the importance of these matters, a consultative and transparent process is essential.

Complete impunity

ZERO per cent. That is the conviction rate in crimes against women and children in Sindh, according to data shared with the Senate's Functional Committee on Human Rights. Not only is that record shocking, but the provincial police chief also appears to have zero interest in the subject. In what the committee's chairperson has considered "a serious violation of rules", the IG Sindh remained absent for a briefing he was supposed to provide the Senate body on the issue last week. His lack of regard for "the growing number of cases of domestic violence, rape, murder, and other crimes in the province", despite repeated reminders to attend, as regretted by the chair, can only be seen as a symptom of the cavalier attitudes that seem to be prevailing in Sindh — and indeed nationwide — when it comes to protecting the most vulnerable citizens. It emerged during the meeting that, out of the 1,058 cases filed, 985 remain in "pending" state. The committee chair also highlighted incidents of rape in religious schools, asking why no action was being taken against those responsible. The Ministry of Human Rights secretary separately regretted provinces' refusal to share relevant data, which has made fighting crime more difficult.

There appear to be a number of areas that need to be looked into urgently, some of which were also highlighted during the meeting. Despite the creation of the Zaraq app, which is tasked with tracing and recovering missing children, it appears that public awareness regarding its services remains minimal, which has greatly limited its utility. Furthermore, the labyrinthine workings of the law seem to be discouraging ordinary people from going to court to seek redress for the crimes committed against them. This has particularly harmful consequences, especially in cases concerning domestic abuse, where the incentives for seeking justice are consistently outweighed by the potential costs of doing so. In some places, the law of the land seems to hold no sway, as dispute resolution continues to be overseen by jirgas operating under outdated and, often, backward customs. On the administrative end, prosecutors and investigators are often unmotivated or undertrained, which leads to weak prosecution of various crimes. All of these are serious challenges for Sindh's provincial authorities to resolve. Lastly, the provincial police, too, need to set their house in order. Their complacency is unacceptable.

Melting glaciers

ACCREDITED glacial melt in the Indus river basin, as highlighted recently by the National Disaster Management Authority, paints a grim picture of the risks facing our region. With a staggering 23.3pc reduction in snow cover and a 16pc loss in glaciers over the past five years, the threat to the basin — which supports nearly 400m people in Pakistan and India — is dire. The impacts are already being felt across the region, with short-lived water surpluses and long-term threats of water scarcity and increased flood risks. The Hindu Kush-Himalayan range, often referred to as the world's Third Pole, feeds this river basin and is vital to about 2bn people who depend on its glacial melt for water, energy and agriculture. The melting glaciers not only threaten the Indus basin's water supply but also impact agriculture and food security across South Asia. The looming possibility of losing 20-75pc of the glaciers' ice volume by the century's end, as noted by some experts, underscores the urgent need for action.

Unfortunately, the stark reality is that political hostilities between India and Pakistan often overshadow these pressing issues. Both nations, already water-stressed and heavily reliant on agriculture for survival, find themselves at odds over many issues, leaving the climate crisis unaddressed. Political disputes have led to a lack of data sharing and collaboration between scientists across borders. This lack of cooperation means that both countries are sleepwalking into what scientists have forecast as "cascading disasters". The impacts of glacial melt are not confined to national borders. Effective management of water resources, sharing of climate data, and joint disaster preparedness initiatives are essential. Discussions at official forums are important, but these must be followed by action that leads to a broader, regional strategy. South Asia's leaders must realize that when it comes to climate threats, political hostilities must take a back seat because floods, droughts and future climatic disasters will wait for no one.

Regaining global relevance

There are no short cuts to rebooting Pakistan's international standing and influence.

PAKISTAN is becoming increasingly marginalised in international affairs. It is no longer able to shape the strategic environment in its neighbourhood to advance its interests, much less influence global geopolitics. The country has faced reverberations in a number of fronts, notably Kashmir and Afghanistan. Once an active diplomatic player in the Middle East, today its principal engagement with the region is to seek rents from rich Arab countries. Even the country's most critical bilateral relationship — with China — is facing challenges. Its international relevance has been progressively declining and its diplomatic options shrinking.

A combination of factors is responsible for this situation. Pakistan's economic weakness, political instability, mounting fiscal, poor governance, continuing internal security threats and strategic confusion. The key question raised by this is why the country was once considered "relevant" in the past when some of these characteristics were also present. The answer is that factors of development and expansion to Pakistan gave it a significant role and importance in global geopolitics. For over two decades after its independence, it was the Cold War that catapulted Pakistan across the position of a small neighbourly ally by the US-led West in its fight against communism. Membership of Western-sponsored military alliances enabled it to benefit from significant economic and military assistance.

In the 1980s, it was the Soviet invasion of Afghanistan that propelled Pakistan in a "front-line" role in the international coalition's campaign to roll back Soviet occupation. The defeat and disintegration of the Soviet Union was followed by a period in which Pakistan's geostrategic importance declined precipitously. This dramatically changed that. Pakistan once again assumed a front-line role in the so-called War on Terror. This enabled the country to coast along for two decades in a globally prominent role as a result of two decades of the US and Nato countries' need for Pakistan's cooperation in the war in Afghanistan.

What all these phases underlined was that that external dynamics, regional geopolitical norms or big power rivalries enhanced Pakistan's international importance. Thus, factors extraneous to the country effected transformations in Paki-

stan's global status, not its intrinsic importance. But in the changed international environment of the post-Cold War era what increasingly mattered was countries' own attributes that gave them importance. These Pakistan came up short. This should have been an urgent call to adjust to new realities. External overreach and internal under-reach had characterised Pakistan's past priorities and actions. That was no longer tenable. But successive governments failed to see the world had changed fundamentally and the days of living off geopolitical rents were over. Ruling elites didn't understand the only way the country could reverse the erosion in its strategic importance was by strengthening and empowering itself at home and putting its own house in order. But it had persisted as did isolated parades.

Pakistan now has to operate in and adapt to a vastly transformed international environment. The post-Cold War era has given way to a world of growing multipolarity, where power is being redistributed and where there is intense competition among states for global influence. In this transformed landscape, it is increasingly the economic power of countries that gives them international clout and heft. Nations with strong economies and who are technology innovators are the ones that have become consequential in the international arena.

The growing importance and rising clout of "middle powers" in global affairs reflects this. Middle powers are not superpowers but have characteristics that give them the ability to influence and shape geopolitics. Most middle powers have strong economies and possess other positive attributes that provide them leverage in global affairs to pursue their national interests as well as the ability to build multi-polar relationships through skilled diplomacy.

The structural changes and dispersal of power in the international system — the currency of power having changed — has created an enabling environment for middle power diplomatic activism and for them to wield greater influence and become global players. Middle powers play off the US-EU-China competition to strengthen their bargaining position while they seek to enhance relations with both global powers. They try to avoid getting into the crosshairs of that cor-

riditation but also reap advantages from it. This urges both the US and China to pay more attention to them to ensure they are not firmly tied to their rival's camp.

Pakistan doesn't figure today among middle powers that include many countries of the Global South, such as Turkey, India, Saudi Arabia, Qatar and Singapore among several others. But it has all the potential to become one. To be internationally relevant, it must first and foremost build a strong and resilient economy that is not reliant on external life support, an honest and law-abiding — an economy integrated into the global economy, which at present it is far from being. This needs efficient governance, political stability and an end to the political squabbles that keep the country in such an unstable, divided and divided state. It also needs an educated citizenry and workforce that has the ability to innovate and contribute to scientific and technological progress. All this will engender national self-confidence that can empower the country with hope and optimism, which acts as a force multiplier.

Along with building domestic strength, incorporating soft power in the country's diplomatic strategy will also help to improve its global standing and reputation. Undoubtedly, as a country's qualities or behaviour that appeals to others, soft power can be an indispensable tool to boost its international influence and image. Pakistan has several soft power resources which if identified and leveraged intelligently can help create positive perceptions about the country and build trust, which in turn, can elevate its position and elicit support from the international community for its foreign policy goals.

To sum up, Pakistan's international relevance now depends on its domestic repositioning and the choices made at home to strengthen the economy, establish durable political stability, provide competent governance, invest in people and address its human development deficit. It also involves fashioning and implementing a coherent and imaginative foreign policy. What should be clear is that there are no short cuts to rebooting Pakistan's global influence. ■

Punjabi nationalism

IN comparison to other northern/north-eastern countries in Asia, like India and Malaysia, Pakistan is an anomaly in that the largest identity group is not formally politicised. While Hindutva is the predominant political force in India, and Malay nationalism remains the basis of the modern Malaysian state, Punjabis do not vote in Punjab in mainstream Pakistani politics.

There are a number of explanations for this. One can argue that Punjabis already enjoy a privileged role in the polity on account of their population numbers from the basis of the National Assembly. With nearly 100 out of 260 directly elected seats coming from north and central Punjab, the region and its chosen representatives carry outsized importance in the making, breaking, and functioning of governments.

Additionally, continuation with colonial-era patterns of economic development and recruitment, especially in the military, ensures more than proportionate Punjabi representation in the state with no greater access to resources. This is partly why districts of north and central Punjab score the highest in any composite measure of human development compared to the rest of the country.

If the political and developmental needs of a population are being addressed by the state to an extent greater than for anyone else, it leaves arguably little room for identity-based politics. While it may make sense for Pakistan's marginalised ethnic groups to mobilise given existing patterns of underdevelopment and political disenfranchisement, the largest group does not wish compulsion.

This is a persuasive argument and probably helps explain the absence of Punjabi ethnic nationalism. However, privileged status and ethnic numbers aren't always enough to limit a group's politicisation. Upper caste Hindus in India are by far the most economically privileged population and enjoy representation greater than even their numbers, yet they continue to mobilise against Muslim and lower-caste "others" in service of a xenial, majoritarian politics.

Indeed, what may push a majority towards majoritarianism is the loss of privilege in a relative sense, which enables victimhood narratives. This is clearly visible in India, where a host of reservation-based concessions made to lower-caste and minority groups continuously triggers those already dominant. The result is an aggressive

and periodically violent backlash.

In Pakistan, there are a few developments taking place, mostly on social media at the moment, which are worth monitoring to assess whether the demographic majority here can go the same way.

The first is an emergent and largely teleursive revival of Punjabi cultural identity in the digital sphere. There is plenty of new internet content covering the history and cultural heritage of the region, highlighting connections with Punjab on the other side of the border, and popularising the use of the Punjabi language.

Such content is useful since it helps revive cultural diversity in a region that adopted regressive religion-tinged nationalism most forcefully after 1947. One aspect of this adoption was that upward mobility in Punjab gradually became synonymous with a diminishing of Punjabi language and heritage by the urban middle classes, often in favour of Punjabi or Karachi.

Residentially, regions that are more developed need to forgo some of their resources to help those areas that lag behind. Any reallocation, such as the reservation of seats in Punjab's universities, should be prevented from being portrayed as an unfair concession. Instead, it should rightly be seen as a necessity for social justice and equality of citizenship.

To finally clear their credit, mainstream parties popular in Punjab generally avoid voicing Punjabi prejudice. The PML-N, a national entity with a strong base in urban Sindh and KP, stands to gain little in any case. The PML-N, on the other hand, has its electoral base largely confined to the province and has occasionally displayed an ethno-regional approach on big questions, such as redistribution of finances under the NFC and devolution of central government power, its track record in more federal.

With N's popularity currently languishing, the allure of polarising Punjabi identity is probably considerable. But it is imperative that it opt out of the mix. The political system is already weighed down by authoritarian governance, regional inequality, and religious fundamentalism. It does not need anakened preoccupation of the majority to be added to the mix. ■

State and citizens

TRUST in the new breed of global politics. Western democracies in particular are preoccupied with rebuilding trust between the state and citizens in an effort to repair a post-World War II social contract that has eroded with growing income inequality, heightened corruption, and cost-of-living crises. Big ideas floating around Western governments are linked to preservation of the social contract: data privacy, universal basic incomes, state support for the green transition. Pakistanis watching this trend should ask how do you restore what you never had.

The social contract is a useful construct for thinking about the relationship between the state and its citizens. The term is used for the formal or informal rules governing how the state and citizens behave and interact with each other, and what obligations they have to each other.

Sadly, the social contract in Pakistan seems non-existent. Citizens are talking to the streets to denounce political persecution, enforced disappearances and extrajudicial killings by the state, media censorship, and price hikes.

More notable is the number of issues that has not provoked a public outcry. Here's just a sampling: a public order law that essentially bans peaceful public protest; the installation of a "self-management system" that will likely make mockery of data privacy; proposed constitutional amendments to fix the chief justice's terms, skewing executive-judiciary dynamics and threatening judicial independence; abuse of anti-terrorism laws, including the recent decision to allow for preventive detention of suspected terrorists in Balochistan without any charges or court orders; proposals for domestic "intervention control"; the findings of an audit of military institutions that highlights how the rules apply selectively. You get the picture.

There are of course a growing number of groups ready to call out the existing violation of the social contract, from PII's page to the Baloch Yekjehi Committee, the Pashtun Tahafuz Movement to Azam March and digital rights groups. These groups' failure to coalesce into a broader civil society movement against state transgressions is often attributed to ethno-geographic differences. But it may be more helpful to consider this through a social contract lens.

Markus Leinen et al in their work on the Middle East point out that social contracts are asymmetric and hierarchical, writing "some citizens and societal groups are more influential than others and have more say in the nature and content of the social contracts". This plurality of social contracts explains why Pakistan will not go

the way of Bangladesh, with a unified uprising. The expectations of the state from each group vary; one feels its social contract has been violated because it is excluded from elite state patronage; another feels betrayed because its loved ones are living arbitrarily elsewhere.

It is a damning critique of our country that there are such inequalities in the social contract negotiated, and that the baseline assumptions of most social contracts (transparency, inclusion, accountability) do not apply. State representatives' growing willingness to unilaterally negotiate divergent social contracts for a privileged few was on display recently with electricity subsidies for some but not others.

Recognising the plurality of social contracts also explains why, despite worsening conditions, most Pakistanis are not panicking. For many citizens, there never was a social contract. Their negotiated expectation extended to their families, tribes, feudal lords. The state never had anything to do with it, and so the state's failings and excesses now remain irrelevant.

The other challenge in Pakistan is that the citizens' counterpart in the social contract remains nebulous. In other contexts (Western democracies) or explicitly authoritarian states, it's clear to all who they have negotiated their social contracts with, and where accountability lies. The peculiarity of our hybrid system is that the social contract cannot be enforced because the real counterpart remains veiled.

So where do we go from here? For many Pakistanis, the social contract is often unacceptable, and they are simply choosing to opt out. Current estimates suggest that 1.6 million Pakistanis have emigrated over the past two years, the informal rate is likely higher, but it could get worse.

When a nation's citizens cannot agree on the basic terms of a social contract among themselves, and the state is not willing to participate in contracts with all its citizens, then fragmentation is inevitable. We stand half this horrifying trajectory. The state must renegotiate its social contract with Pakistani citizens, and they, in turn, must collectively seek an equal and inclusive contract among them. ■

Irsa controversy

THE Indus River System Authority is again in the spotlight. Following on the footsteps of the previous caretaker government, the present regime is also, most painstakingly, working on amending the Irsa Act, 1992. The caretaker government managed an ordinance to amend the Act in February 2024. Former president Arif Alvi declined to sign off on the ordinance and issued a note of objection. However, it became a constitutional fait accompli after the Prime Minister's Office countermanded it. Subsequently, its proponents managed to get a former Wapda chairman, known to be a staunch advocate of the controversial proposed Kalabagh dam, mollified as the new law chairman. However, the ensuing political machination compelled the PM's Office to rescind the notification and eventually the ordinance was buried without being promulgated.

The contentious amendment was resurrected recently when a meeting was convened at the President's Office on July 8. According to the minutes of the meeting, officials of the Green Pakistan Initiative (GPI) apprised the president of the necessity of an amendment to the existing Irsa Act, and this was endorsed by the president. This time, a more dubious draft of the amendment was pushed through the law chairman's office. The draft aims to delineate the federal character of Irsa by making the latter a centrally controlled body, fully subservient to a chairman to be handpicked by the PM.

The proposed chairman, a Grade-21 serving or retired officer of the federal government, has been given monolithic powers to co-opt more members and create an independent Committee of Experts. Section 8 of the proposed amendment authorises the independent experts' committee to lay down the technical basis for regulation and distribution of surface water. This clause has set off alarm bells as it renders Irsa's provincial members redundant and reduced to a rubber stamp. Water allocation on a 50:50 basis for every single canal has already been established under the 1991 Water Apportionment Accord. Any new technical basis for water distribution by a handpicked experts' committee will render the Accord ineffective. Article 7 of the proposed amendment further limits the role of the provincial members by stipulating that all decisions involving technical matters shall be taken after seeking necessary technical assistance from the experts' committee.

Constitutionally, Irsa is a subject of the Council of Common Interests under the Federal Legislative List. Under Article 155 of the Constitution, the CCI decides on water-related disputes. Hence, matters pertaining to Irsa come within the CCI's

powers; no other office, including the presidency, has jurisdiction over its affairs. However, those eager to bring Irsa under their grip have circumvented the constitutional forum and attempted to meddle with the regulatory body through the country's highest office.

The proposed amendment has stirred a strong reaction in Sindh from political parties, governors' associations, civil society and media. The proposed amendment is being seen as an attempt to make Irsa an Islamabad-controlled body with mere token representation by the provinces.

A marathon session of the Sindh Assembly unanimously adopted a resolution against the anticipated amendment. The resolution considers it against the democratic spirit of federalism, which will not make the amendment acceptable to the people of Sindh. Lawmakers criticised the amendment, which is aimed at controlling Irsa and thus tampering with water distribution. Recently, PPP MNAs Khurshid Shah, Naeed Qamar, Ghulam Ali Talpur and Murtab Rasheed, speaking in the National Assembly, questioned the proposed Irsa amendment and the rationale behind the plan to irrigate millions of acres of barren land under the GPI. They asked about the availability of water for the massive phasing.

Replying to a question, Minister for Water Resources Mianuddin Malhi confirmed that 812,000 acres of land have been acquired so far for barren land under cultivation in Punjab and Sindh. The GPI is pursuing an ambitious plan of corporate farming over large parcels of hitherto barren land. While national food security and the import of grain are important objectives, it also requires water, not just land. Under the present arrangement, all the available water is committed. Except when there is a very wet season, water shortages in the river basin often trigger conflicts between the upper and lower riparian. Pakistan can enhance grain productivity by employing improved water management technologies, opting for water-thirsty crops, planting crop varieties, using appropriate seeds and agro-techniques and adopting climate-resilient agriculture practices. The GPI should focus on innovative options to increase crop and water productivity. ■

Higher education is in a bade shape



IN its Aug 29 judgement in a constitutional petition taken up in terms of Article 194(3) of the Constitution, titled 'All Public Universities RPP Teachers Association vs Federation of Pakistan', the Supreme Court (SC) noted some disturbing factors in the public-sector universities in the country were facing made no mention.

The findings were based on a report submitted by the Ministry of Federal Education and Professional Training.

There are 12 universities under the ministry's purview, two each in Sindh and Khyber Pakhtunkhwa (KPK), and four each in Punjab and Islamabad. All these universities are either working without vice-chancellors (VCs) or without other senior positions, while some have such vacancies filled in with temporary appointments or on ad hoc basis.

One university in Multan has a VC who has occupied the post since a decade without undergoing proper competitive recruitment process using political affiliation. It was further observed by the SC that the Board of Governors do not hold meetings as required by the constitution of respective universities.

The condition of universities under the control of provincial governments is not different. Out of five universities in Balochistan, three universities have ad hoc VCs, while the VCs of the remaining two have obtained stay orders from the Balochistan High Court.

Besides, the report submitted by the KP government disclosed that out of 34 universities, 19 do not have regular VC.

Moving on, according to a similar report from the Punjab government, 25 of the 34 universities are working without a regular VC. According to the Sindh government, seven universities do not have regular VCs. As such, holding of meetings as mandated by the constitution of the universities is also not being followed, observed the SC.

The SC has made it clear that public-sector universities must comply with their

respective laws, and those in charge of them must demonstrate that they are competent enough to hold their respective positions. Transgressions adverse to affect academics, the reputation and standing of Pakistani universities, and also undermine the degrees awarded by them, noted the SC.

We can only hope that those in charge will take a serious note of the state of affairs prevailing in public-sector universities. Until we improve our education system and equip people with the right tools, our dreams of progress cannot be realised.

Population explosion

THIS is with reference to the article 'Population explosion' (July 22). The population of the area that comprised West Pakistan at the time of partition was around 30 million. Now, according to a conservative forecast, the unbridled population will surpass past 400 million by the time we cross the centennial celebrations. During this long journey of 77 years, we have not added, compared or taken possession of any additional land area to bring it under cultivation for agricultural produce in order to attain food security. In fact, in many places the cultivable land has been encroached upon by the land mafia.

In plain words, while the land holding remains constant at 881,913 square kilometres, the population has increased by about 218 million already.

Similarly, the density of people at 108.05 per square kilometre in 2024 compared to 47.35 in 1950 is definitely disproportionate to the available resources.

The above is a fine example of the Malthusian theory regarding exponential population growth compared to arithmetic food-supply growth. In Europe when the population was rising at a rapid rate, the food supply was also increasing simultaneously due to technological developments, whereas this has never been the case with Pakistan. The recent import of wheat, no spoke one instance, is before us all.

With no means to feed and resource being scarce, infant mortality, underweight babies, undernourished children, malnutrition and stunted growth are at an 40 per cent of the newborns and infants in their formative years of life. Eventually, by the same deficiencies are reflected and carried over while growing up.

Ever since the 1960s, every government is apparently making efforts to contain the population growth, but all these efforts seem to have gone to waste.

Unfortunately, the growth rate has continued to hover around 2.8% per the latest census in 2023, whereas it is around 1.6% to 1.7% in the region.

The policymakers need to review the population planning programme, as well as the right to reproductive health while figuring out what went wrong.

In the past and what remedial steps should be taken to avoid the onslaught.

Revitalising NSC

PUNJAB NOTES

National history: our 'this and that'

WHEN I was working for Pakistan Television, a colleague, who was a senior administrator, narrated an anecdote over a cup of tea regarding PTV's administrative affairs. "Some years back an international one-day cricket match was to be played in Lahore. For its live coverage an OR Van (outside) outdoor broadcast van was requisitioned from PTV Centre, Lahore. I was camera manager. We reached PTV centre and had a meeting with the general and the administrative manager regarding the security arrangement. Admin manager said, 'I assure you nothing untoward will happen'. I insisted that there should beised security arrangement for the van and for our personal vehicles. He assured us that security would be tight. Next day when we set up the recording equipment, the stadium was already stock-in-block. As the match started a big crowd crept tried to gate crash. A local member of the crew told me that tribunes of cricketer Shafiq Afridi had gathered and

wanted to enter the stadium without tickets. They argued with the security staff that they had the right to watch the match for free as the cricketer boy was from their Afridi tribe. In the meantime, Shafiq Afridi came to bat and got out in no time. There was a hollabash. Security deployed at the gate pushed the high-hungry mob back which turned violent because they had failed to see their boy in action. It started pelting the parked vehicles with stones. When we came out of the end of the match I found my car with front and back windows totally smashed. Outraged, we reached the TV centre and had a meeting with the general and admin managers. I protested loudly that why our personal vehicles were not protected as promised. The admin manager, responsible for the arrangement, replied, "It's not my fault. If Afridi had not got out so soon, nothing would have happened." I threw my arms up.

"If this or that had not happened it is a natural pattern of our culture, especially when we talk about our history. Such happenings spring from our national failure of what we professionally wanted to

achieve but failed. It is a product of collective despair. Lack of better future compels us to be obsessed with the past. But the past offers little more than what it has created, a bleak tomorrow. Scarred of the things which are ahead and damage pointed by what happened in the past pushes us into a state that prevents us from moving; we enter the cocoon of alternative reality. It's a definitive measure that prevents us from managing the pain of failure. With the benefit of hindsight we imagine what other options were available when we made a particular decision in a particular situation. But we pay scant attention to the concrete conditions which forced us to choose what we chose. We are generally more concerned with the consequences of what we chose, not with why we chose what we chose.

M.A. Jinnah, the founder of the state, declared on March 21, 1948 in Dholka that Urdu alone would be the sole national language of Pakistan and just for once he was forced by Bengalis who were not only at the forefront of Pakistan Movement but also formed the majority population of the new

state. They protested and it morphed into a political conflict. We now whisper in hushed tones that if this had not happened the seeds of separation would not have been sown. But we hesitate to analyse the factors that made them to take such a step.

We refuse to understand why Bengalis loved their language so much? We have internalised the imposition of foreign languages such as Urdu and English during the Raj. Bengalis had seen the remnants of Bengal during the Raj. The first Nobel Laureate from India was part of these languages. We ignore the fact that M.A. Jinnah who spoke just two languages, Gujarati and English, was as influenced by Muslim leaders of Uttar Pradesh that he made their language the national language of Pakistan. What am I trying? He couldn't speak Urdu, his national language. If he had not done this is another story.

In 1958, General Ayub Khan supported by his fellow generals and civil bureaucrats mostly imported from India imposed martial law and put the politicians in jail or debarred them from politics. He stalled the process of mass democracy and

created the One Unit lumping all the diverse regions of West Pakistan together that provoked an angry response from the regions forced to form it except Punjab. They were diverse regions having distinct histories, languages and identities. The effort was designed to sacrifice the richness of diversity, taken as dangerous poverty, at the altar of ill-conceived notion of monolithic national identity. Combined with it was a hideous notion of parity between the One Unit (West Pakistan) and Bengal (East Pakistan). Both were declared equal defying the fact that latter had majority of population.

The 1951 census shows that the West Pakistan had population of 33.7 million while the East Pakistan had population of around 42 million. So 33.7 million people were equal to 42 million people. The more was the loss and vice versa. It had direct impact on legislative powers, distribution of national resources, administrative and government jobs. To understand why we faced this tragic situation we mustn't forget that at the time of the Partition, Pakistan received only 22.5 percent of British India's assets and liabilities. But in terms of military resources, it got 50pc and India got 40pc. I repeat, 50pc assets and 40pc military resources. It resulted in the civil-military imbalance which led to the 1971 debacle.

Again we pose for what we lost. If General Yahya's criteria and Z.A. Bhutto supported by Punjabis and Sindhi Bengalis had accepted the results of the 1970 national elections, the country would have remained united. If Bhutto had not launched a military operation after dissolving Balochistan's democratic government in 1974 exerting his control over the province. He was judicially murdered. If Akbar Bugti of Balochistan was not killed by dictator Musharraf, we wouldn't have the current unrest in the province. We respect the liberty of 'jil' or 'mujra' of masses. Our decisions are encouraged on us because they were driven by the urge for power and vested interests, not by reasoning and fairness. Eight booked for 'attacking' women in four incidents

They said the dacoits also tortured Ahmed for afferent resistance.

Following the incident, the village residents blocked the road for traffic for two hours. On being informed of the situation, Chakwari ASP Muhammad Manz held negotiations with the police and assured them of increased patrolling in the area.

MoU signed for building modern vegetable, fruit market

Two held for online harassment, blackmail

suspecting duplicate identity cards.

CLASH AVERTED: A potential clash between the Muslim and Ahmadisya communities was averted on Sunday in Gojra, Chak 369 JB Jodha Nagri, due to the intervention of police and religious leaders.

Reports said that the conflict arose after the mother of an Ahmadi, Sultan Sikander, was buried in a shared graveyard.

Turkash Lubabik, Pakistani leader Mian Masdar Muhammad Ghani and Saeem Khatri Nasirwan president Saeem Khatri announced a protest.

However, former Gojra Bar Association president Taseer Khan mediated between police and protesters. It was agreed that the Ahmadisya community would immediately construct boundary walls around their graves to separate their buried grounds

from those of Muslims.

SUSPENDED: Superintendent of Police Atif Zafar suspended Roshan Police ASI Atif Yar and constables Ghazanfar and Ilyas from jobs Sunday for conducting an illegal raid and torturing Sugra Riba.

Also, four Dolphin police officials publicly criticised Sardar on Saigandhi Road. Militants used video game features in Swat police station attack, claim officials

DPO says they traced an attacker with the help of CCTV footage

PESHAWAR: Militants applied features introduced in *PlayerUnknown's Battlegrounds*, a video game commonly known as PUBG, to assault a police station in Swat, according to senior officials. They said that militants used PUBG's chat room for communication to avoid electronic surveillance and being tracked down.

On August 28, Rani police station in Swat came under a militant attack, which left a police

man martyred and two others wounded.

According to district police, investigation was launched into the attack and militants were traced after monitoring of CCTV footage of different surveillance cameras for several hours.

The district police officer of Swat, Dr Zabihullah, said police found one person using a mobile phone and they believed that it would help them to hunt down the militants. However, militants never called each other but utilised features of PUBG to avoid being traced, he added.

"The militants would play PUBG to practice and motivate their group members for battle against the state and would use the chat room for communication to avoid electronic surveillance and being tracked down."

On August 28, Rani police station in Swat came under a militant attack, which left a police

man martyred and two others wounded.

He added that it was too difficult to reach the target and arrest militants in absence of clues.

He said that initially, investigators were focusing on a motorbike, which in the CCTV footage passed in front of the police station minutes before explosion took place. He said that the investigators believed a hand grenade had been lobbed at the police station. However, it was not the case, he added.

Mr Zabihullah said that it was difficult to find out as to what was actually used for the attack because there was nothing on ground which could prove that a hand grenade was used in the attack.

"They had used an improvised explosive device, made of a power bank, which is mostly used for

charging mobile phones, for the attack," he said. He added that one of the suspected militants was finally traced through several CCTV footages.

The district police officer stated that during investigation, the accused revealed names of two other suspected militants, who were also arrested and shared with the investigation team that they never used common means for communication and would change mobile phones and their SIMs repeatedly.

"They had created a chat room in PUBG for communication and exchanging messages," he said. He said that the militants belonged to a local, Marad alias Rahmatullah group, affiliated with the banned Tehreek-i-Taliban Pakistan. He said that

Marad, head of the group, and family members of the suspected militants, were living across the border in Afghanistan.

"We have proved that suspected militants remained in contact with their family members and Rahmatullah group in Afghanistan and that they never travelled to Afghanistan but Karachi," he said.

Mr Zabihullah also stated that family members of the suspected militants were involved in militant activities and were wanted by law enforcement agencies. He added that suspected militants' family members escaped Operation Raft-i-Ram, a military operation against militants in Swat in 2009. He said that around 2,000 families of militants belonging to Swat were residing in Afghanistan.

Parents urged not to boycott polio drives for 'petty' demands

KOSLAT: Kohat divisional commissioner Syed Munawar Bilal Shah has urged the people not to look polio vaccination of their children, with common demands like electricity and gas supply and construction of roads because such are attitudes compromised the health of their children and their future.

Emphasising the importance of polio drops for children, he said the society as a whole must protect children from lifelong disability.

He made the appeal while addressing an awareness session held in the wake of the recent boycott of the polio campaign by the people of some Local Union councils.

MPA Daud Shah Afridi, Larkot tehsil chairman Ghani Khan, coordinator of the expanded programme on immunisation Dr Mohabbat Ali Bangash and others who spoke on the occasion.

Frontline polio workers and community members were also in attendance. The commissioner appealed to the parents to allow polio drops to their children as it was their national responsibility.

MPA Daud Shah Afridi presented upon the elders to separate their daily life demands from polio drops. He called for not only vaccinating children against polio but also against 12 other diseases under the EPI programme.

Mr Afridi urged the community to have trust in their government and seek guidance from religious leaders to clear any misconception about polio eradication.

The MPA emphasised the need for the adoption of a coherent strategy on polio vaccination and taking influential leaders into confidence for dealing with polio refusal cases.

EPI coordinator Dr Bangash emphasised the need for addressing the issues faced by frontline workers. He said the session aimed to create awareness about the importance of polio vaccination and to address the misconceptions and concerns of parents. — Correspondent

Former DHO charge-sheeted for running fake polio drive

PESHAWAR: Chief Secretary Northern Areas Chaudhary has charged former district officer of North Waziristan for running fake polio campaign, restoring services of terminated employees and making illegal appointments, directing him to explain his position within two weeks.

Dr Haifullah Khan, the former DHO of North Waziristan, currently medical officer in Kohat, was found to be unwilling to participate in supplementary immunisation activities (SIA) scheduled to implement the growing review meetings' decisions regarding campaign and strategic that health staff to take part in polio campaigns effectively.

The doctor in IGP-17 also compromised on accountability of the staff during his tenure as DHO which resulted in detection of two polio cases in the last week of April 2022 in North Waziristan.

The charge sheet issued from the office of chief secretary also said that Dr Haifullah also issued salaries to 296 employees, who had been terminated by health department after an inquiry revealed that most of them were recruited illegally and some of them were abroad but they received salaries.

The DHO, the charge sheet, said also concealed the facts about those employees from the director-general

Health Services (DGHS) of Khyber Pakhtunkhwa.

"The employee continued to receive salaries and caused loss to national kitty of an amount of Rs 2.5 million, which showed negligence on your part," it said. It added that other appointed nine employees on discharge's non quota.

A cleric has also been included in the charge sheet.

"Therefore, you appear to be guilty of misconduct under Rule-3 of Khyber Pakhtunkhwa Government Services (Efficiency and Discipline) Rules, 2011, and have rendered yourself to all or any of the positions specified in Rule-8. You are, therefore, required to submit your written defense within 10 days and not more than two weeks to the inquiry officer and also intimation if you want to be heard in person," said the charge sheet.

The DHO has been instructed to comply with the directions and reach the inquiry committee within the given time. "In case of failure it shall be presumed that you have committed the offence within 10 days and not more than two weeks to the inquiry officer and also intimation if you want to be heard in person," it said.

A two-member committee including Shafid Khan, a IGP-19 officer, and Mohammad Shaukat, also IGP-19 officer, has been constituted to start formal inquiry against the former DHO and submit its report to chief secretary regarding polio and recruitment issue accordingly.

Separately, another inquiry committee relating to fake appointments has also been formed under Fazil Alam, a IGP-19 officer, with Dr Faiz Maslak, the DHO of Kohat, to probe the matter.

The first inquiry has been started on complaint of World Health Organisation that fake vaccination campaign has been shown in papers and there are stains of fake finger-marking. The deputy commissioner of the relevant district had also complained that the DHO didn't attend evening meetings regarding polio immunisation.

Earlier, an inquiry had taken place but the chief secretary didn't agree with its recommendations and rejected the same and ordered fresh probe into the matter.

Sources said that the chief secretary had directed that laxity would not be tolerated in polio immunisation.

Recently, he issued instructions to all deputy commissioners, district police officers and district officers to ensure their active participation in polio-related meetings to wipe out the crippling ailment.

Sources said that fake finger-marking had become a chronic issue, which showed children vaccinated despite the fact that their fingers were marked with indelible ink without vaccinating them. "Legally, vaccinators mark the finger of vaccine's recipient after giving them drops," they said.

SOUTH WAZIRISTAN: The wildlife department has failed an attempt to smuggle 70 demoiselle cranes in Lower South Waziristan tribal district.

"The cranes were seized at the Skandar checkpoint on the Wana-Gomal Zara Road," sub-divisional wildlife officer (SDWO) Syed Khan said.

He told Dawn on Sunday that the seized cranes would be transferred to divisional office, Dera Ismail Khan. He said demoiselle cranes were a distinct type among various crane species.

He said Saeed Rehman, a hunter from Banu, was arrested on Saturday when he was caught transporting 70 demoiselle cranes in a single-cabin vehicle from Gul Kulch area to Wana-Gomal Zara Road.

SDWO Syed Khan said Lower South Waziristan had rich biodiversity and was considered a paradise for migratory birds. He said South Waziristan's Wana subdivision was located on the internationally recognised Indus Flyway of migratory birds, and thousands of migratory birds passed over this area twice a year during their long journeys from Central Asia to the subcontinent and vice versa.

He said the biodiversity's protection, preservation, conservation, and sustainable management was the prime responsibility of the South Waziristan's wildlife department.

Every year, these cranes migrate from their habitats in Indian Punjab and coastal areas of Sindh to Siberia and Central Asian Republics via Zhob, Dera Ismail Khan, South Waziristan and Kunar districts. They fly in flocks of up to 400 individuals, reaching altitudes of 10,000-20,000 feet.

Lakki reports three dengue cases

LAKKI MARwat: Three dengue cases have surfaced in the Lakki Marwat district during the ongoing month, prompting the health authorities to rush the affected areas to implement the case response mechanism.

Talking to reporters on Sunday, Mohammad Javed Khan, an entomologist at the district health office, said three patients with fever and body aches visited the health facilities, where they tested positive for dengue virus.

He said Muhammad din, 15, Rahmatullah, 42, and Faridullah, 27, had a travel history. "Muhammad din, a secondary student, reached his native Wana Amrit area from Islamabad," he added.

Rahmatullah hailing from Titterkot area is a driver, who arrived in his village from Peshawar. He was diagnosed with dengue after his blood test was conducted at the District Headquarters Hospital, Tapperai.

Mr Javed said a third case was reported from Tapperai area when Faridullah, an electrician, who lived in Islamabad tested positive for dengue.

The official said district health officer Dr Abdul Qayyum had directed the subordinate officials to implement the case response mechanism in letter and spirit.

He said the health department conducted anti-dengue spray inside the houses of the patients and also provided the inmates with insecticide-treated nets.

The official said fumigation and larva eradication activity was also carried out in the rural localities. He said health experts also conducted screening of the family members of the dengue patients.

Khyber Aman Pasoon opposes military action, formation of peace bodies

Speakers allege innocent people are harassed during 'so-called' search operations'

KHYBER: Speakers at Khyber Aman Pasoon (peace uprising) in Bora on Sunday rejected military operations, formation of peace committees and said that people of Khyber would no more tolerate self-imposed terrorism, lashkaras and shedding of blood of innocent tribesmen.

Organised under the banner of Baba Sayeed ul Haq (BSU), the gathering was attended by people of Khyber districts in large numbers. BSU president Sharif Afridi, MMA leader Afridi, MPAs Naseem Afridi and Model

Ghuri Afridi, tribal elder Malik Wari Khan, former federal minister Hameedullah Jan and a number of local politicians and social activists addressed the gathering.

Speakers in their emotional speeches conveyed to the authorities concerned that people of Khyber through their Sunday Aman Pasoon rejected intimidation through extortion calls, kidnapping for ransom, targeted killings, targeted bomb attacks on their houses and terrorising localities in the name of extremism.

"Our voices can no longer be silenced through such harassments and intimidations. We will continue to raise our voices against such excesses and barbaric acts," they declared among protesters against the formation of peace and rejection of militancy and military operations.

Speakers alleged that innocent people were harassed during so-called search operations while security agencies were also involved with locals picked up for interrogations on pretext of having affiliation with outlawed groups.

They called upon all security agencies, counterterrorism department and police to refrain from raiding the houses of innocent tribesmen without prior warrant and stop unnecessary checking of people at the so-called security checkpoints, which most of the tribemen took as a personal insult.

The people of tribal districts have lost their faith and trust in the role of law enforcement agencies as they are mostly involved in unconstitutional and illegal acts, which will ultimately result in promotion of lawlessness and insecurity," they said.

Expressing their deep concern and displeasure over deteriorating law and order in the region, speakers reminded the state institutions to fulfil their prime responsibility of restoring peace and safeguarding the lives and honour of common people.

While demanding immediate abolition of Action in Aid to Civil Power, they termed it a black law and alleged that it was the mother of lawlessness, injustice, chaos and insecurity in tribal districts.

They insisted that a purge is holding of peace keepers in different parts of Khyber Pakhtunkhwa from a manifestation of common people's dis-

pleasure over government's failure to restore peace and ensure security of citizens.

"We believe that a deliberate attempt is made by some elements or institutions to subdue the land earned power in Khyber and other tribal districts with law enforcement agencies required to keep an eye on the movement of innocent people and take practical steps to foil all attempts of subjugating power," they need.

Speakers said that the last two decades of military and extremism adversely affected economy of tribal areas and badly impacted the social fabric along with positive local youth towards extremism.

"We want to give a clear cut message to all the stakeholders that tribemen have now become aware of all such aspirations and will foil all attempts aimed at imposition of terrorists on us with a strong determination," they said.

US to give Bangladesh \$202m in aid

DILIAK The United States is committed to supporting Bangladesh's inclusive economic growth, institution building and development and will provide an additional \$202 million of aid, a US delegation said during a visit to Dhaka on Saturday.

The six-member delegation, led by Deputy Under Secretary of the Treasury Department Brent Neiman, is the first from the US since the interim government headed by Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina took office last month following the ousting of Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina after deadly protests.

In a relieved address last week, Chief Advisor Yousaf said the government was appealing for \$5 billion in aid to help stabilize an economy that has been struggling since the Ukraine war sharply increased the cost of fuel and food imports. Bangladesh last year sought a \$4.7 billion bailout from the International Monetary Fund.

The United States Agency for International Development (USAID) said it would provide a \$202 million grant to promote good governance, social, human and economic opportunity and resilience, in a deal signed on Sunday in Dhaka. It follows a 2021 agreement whereby USAID pledged a total of \$954 million between 2021 and 2025, of which \$425 million had already been provided.

In a statement released on its Facebook page following the meeting with Yousaf, the US embassy emphasized its readiness to support Bangladesh in its pursuit of a more "sustainable and inclusive future".

Yousaf sought US support to help rebuild Bangladesh, carry out essential reforms to the judiciary, police and financial institutions and to recover assets stolen by the previous regime, according to a statement from his office.—Reuters

Kolkata college head charged for tampering in rape case

KOLKATA India's federal police have charged the former head of R. G. Kar Medical College in Kolkata with tampering with evidence linked to the rape and murder of a junior female doctor, a case that triggered weeks of nationwide protests.

Former college principal Samir Ghosh is already in police custody for suspected graft. The additional charges were made against him in a petition filed on Saturday by the Central Bureau of Investigation (CBI) before a court.

The CBI also arrested Abhijit Mondal, the officer in charge of police station

that has jurisdiction over the college, for failing to protect the crime scene, a source with direct knowledge of the matter said.

Asked about Mondal's arrest, a senior Kolkata police official said: "We will respond to the charges in court." The lawyer representing Ghosh could not be immediately reached for comment.

The rape and murder of the 31-year-old doctor, whose body was found at the college more than a month ago, set off a wave of protests by doctors demanding greater safety for women in the workplace and justice for their slain colleagues.—Reuters

Artificial Intelligence and cryptocurrency sectors consumed nearly 460 terawatt hours of electricity in 2022 — two per cent of total global production

MONTRÉAL If you care about the environment, think twice about using AI. Generative artificial intelligence uses 30 times more energy than a traditional search engine, while researcher Barbara Webb, on a mission to raise awareness about the environmental impact of the fast new technology.

Recognized as one of the 100 most influential people in the world of AI by the American magazine Time in 2024, the Canadian computer scientist of Russian origin

has sought for several years to quantify the emissions of programmes like ChatGPT or Midjourney.

"I find it particularly disappointing that generative AI is used to search the internet," lamented the researcher, who spoke on the sidelines of the AIIA artificial intelligence conference, in Montreal.

The language models on which the programmes are based require enormous computing capacities to train on billions of data points, necessitating powerful servers.

Then there's the energy used to respond to each individual user's requests. Instead of simply extracting information, "like a search engine would do, find the capital of a country, for example," AI programmes "generate new information," making the whole thing "much more energy intensive," she explains.

According to the International Energy Agency, the combined AI and the crypto-currency sectors consumed nearly 460 ter-

awatt hours of electricity in 2022 — two per cent of total global production.

Energy efficiency

A leading researcher on the impact of AI on climate, Lucasini participated in 2020 in the creation of a tool for developers to quantify the carbon footprint of existing pieces of code, "CodeCarbon" that since then downloaded more than a million times.

Head of the climate strategy of startup Hugging Face, a platform for sharing open-source AI models, she is now working on creating a certification system for algorithms.

Similar to the programme from the US Environmental Protection Agency that awards scores based on the energy consumption of electronic devices and appliances, it would make it possible to know an AI product's energy consumption in order to encourage users and developers to "make better decisions". "We don't take into account water or raw materials," she

acknowledges, "but at least we know that for a specific task, we can measure energy efficiency and say that this model has an A+, and that model has a D." She says,

Transparency

In order to develop her tool, Lucasini is experimenting with it on generative AI models that are accessible to everyone, on open source, but she would also like to do it on commercial models from Google or ChatGPT creator OpenAI, which have been reluctant to agree.

Although Microsoft and Google have committed to achieving carbon neutrality by the end of the decade, the US tech giants see their greenhouse gas emissions soar in 2023 because of AI: up 48pc for Google compared to 2019 and 27pc for Microsoft compared to 2020.

"We are accelerating the climate crisis," says Lucasini, calling for more transparency from tech companies. The solution,

she says, could come from governments that, for the moment, are "flying blindly," without knowing what is "in the data sets or how the algorithms are trained." Once we have transparency, we can start legislating."

Energy sobriety

It is also necessary to "explain to people what generative AI can and cannot do, and at what cost," according to Lucasini. In her latest study, the researcher demonstrated that producing a high-definition image using artificial intelligence consumes as much energy as fully recharging the battery of your cell phone.

At a time when more and more companies want to integrate the technology further into our lives — with conversational bots and connected devices, or in online searches — Lucasini advocates "energy sobriety." The idea here is not to oppose AI, she emphasizes, but rather to choose the right tools — and use them judiciously.—AFP

Parts of Europe in grips of worst flooding in decades

- Many rivers overflow, suspending road traffic and railway lines
- War-ravaged Ukraine offers to send rescuers, specially equipped to deal with floods

Around 1,600 people have been evacuated in Slovakia and Polish authorities have called in the army to support firefighters.

Separately, a fireman in northeastern Austria died in floods in the Lower Austrian region, which has been classified as natural disaster area, regional governor Johann Michael Leitner told reporters.

"For many residents, the upcoming hours will be the worst of their lives," said a spokesman. Emergency services had made nearly 5,000 interventions overnight in the village of Vilkovo Hartice, residents put up a wall of sandbags 50 metres long in an effort to hold back the rising waters of the River Opatava.

"If we don't stop the river, it will flood the lower part of the village," local bather Jacek Luka said.

Catastrophe of epic proportions

In southeastern Romania, another body was found on Sunday in the water-bloated Galati region, where four people had died on Saturday. "We are again facing the effects of climate change, which are increasing

truly present on the European continent, with dramatic consequences," Romanian President Klaus Iohannis said.

Hundreds of people have been rescued across 19 parts of the country, emergency services said, releasing a video of flooded houses in a village by the Danube river.

"This is a catastrophe of epic proportions," said Crin Dragomir, mayor of Slobozia Conachi, a village in Galati, where he said 700 houses had been flooded. Romania's interior minister said more than 5,000 households and 15,000 people were affected in the region.

Snow in September

In Austria, some areas of the Tyrol region were blanketed by up to a metre (three feet) of snow — an exceptional situation for mid-September, which saw temperatures of up to 39 degrees Celsius (102 Fahrenheit) last week. Rail services were suspended in the country's east earlier Sunday. In neighbouring Slovakia, a state of emergency has been declared in the capital Bratislava.—AFP

Philippine ship leaves flashpoint reef

MANILA A Philippine vessel that spent months anchored at a disputed reef in the South China Sea has left the area, the national maritime council said on Sunday.

The Philippine Coast Guard ship BRP Teresa Magbanua had been anchored inside the Scarborough Shoal since April to assert Manila's claims to the area and prevent China from mining it.

Beijing has continued to press its claims to almost the entire South China Sea despite an international tribunal ruling that its assertion has no legal basis.

Philippine and Chinese vessels have collided at least three times recently near Scarborough Shoal, located 140 kilometers (86 miles) from the Philippines' western island of Palawan and 1,200 kilometers from China's nearest major landmass, Hainan island.

The Teresa Magbanua's bridge wing and forecastle were damaged in one of the collisions.

"During her deployment... she challenged an encroachment by a larger flotilla of intruders, barked inclement weather, with her crew surviving on diminished daily provisions," National Maritime Council Chairperson Executive Secretary Lucas Bersamin said in a statement.

Last month, Chinese vessels blocked a resupply mission to the Philippines on board the ship, leaving them running critically low of food and other provisions.

The Teresa Magbanua "carried out her sentinel duties against overwhelming odds", Bersamin added.

China's coast guard raised the ship's withdrawal on Sunday, and said Beijing "fully indisputable sovereignty over... Scarborough Shoal and its adjacent waters", using the Chinese name for Scarborough Shoal.—AFP

Lebanese novelist Elias Khoury dies aged 76

BERJET Novelist Elias Khoury, one of Lebanon's most renowned writers and a fervent advocate of the Palestinian cause, died on Sunday from illness aged 76, sources close to his family said.

Khoury, who was born in 1948 to a Christian family in Beirut, died in the Lebanese capital where he had been based for months, the sources said.

Over several decades, Khoury produced a large body of work in Arabic that focused on the themes of collective memory, war and exile, alongside writing for newspapers, teaching literature and editing a publication linked to the Palestine Liberation Organization (PLO).

Many of his books were translated into foreign languages, including French, English, German, Hebrew and Spanish.

One of his best-known novels, "Gate of

the Sun", tells the story of Palestinian refugees expelled from their homes in 1948 during the war that coincided with Israel's foundation.

Hundreds of thousands of Palestinians were driven out or expelled from their homes during that war, in what Palestinians call the Nakba, or catastrophe in Arabic. The novel was made into a film by Egyptian director Youssef Nabil.

Khoury also wrote about Lebanon's 1975-1990 civil war in novels like "Little Mountain" and "Yala".

A champion of the Palestinian cause since his youth, Khoury was managing editor of the PLO-linked Palestine Al-Quds magazine from 1975 to 1979, together with poet Mahmoud Darwish.—AFP

Over 40 injured in Kharkiv strike

KYIV: A Russian-guided bomb struck a multi-story apartment building on Sunday in Kharkiv, Ukraine's second largest city, triggering a fire and injuring at least 41 people, the region's governor said.

President Volodymyr Zelensky said the latest attack underscored the need for Ukraine's Western partners to provide weapons and air defence systems and permission to use weaponry on targets deep inside Russia to save lives.

Oleg Syromyatnikov, governor of Kharkiv region in northeastern Ukraine, said on Telegram that rescue operations were proceeding, with 12 people in hospital, three in serious condition. He said residents could be trapped under rubble.

Syromyatnikov posted photos of heavy damage to the top floor of five stories of the building, with smoke and fire billowing out of shattered windows.

Zelensky, in his eighth video address, said three other guided bombs had struck villages in Kharkiv region, whose population centres have been a frequent target of Russian attacks near the Russian border.

Russia did not immediately respond to a request for comment on the apartment building but has denied intentionally targeting civilians despite having killed thousands of them since it invaded Ukraine in 2022.

Zelensky called for rapid decisions on long-range strikes "in order to destroy Russian military aviation right where it is based. These are obvious, logical decisions."

"Every Russian strike of this nature, every instance of Russian terror, like today in Kharkiv, this proves that there must be long-range capability and it must be sufficient."

The aid appropriations decisions were proposed in the first instance from the United States, France, Germany and Italy. "These three decisions can help save lives," he said.

Russian President Vladimir Putin said last week that the West would be directly fighting with Russia if it allowed Ukraine to strike Russian territory with Western-made long-range missiles.—Reuters

Kejriwal to resign as Delhi CM

NEW DELHI: Just a day after being released on bail, Indian opposition leader Arvind Kejriwal said on Sunday he would resign as chief minister of the Delhi regional government.

Kejriwal, 55, was granted bail on Friday by India's Supreme Court and left prison on Saturday almost six months after being detained in relation to alleged irregularities in the capital city's liquor policy.

A Delhi critic of Indian Prime Minister Narendra Modi, Kejriwal whose ideologically Aam Aadmi Party (AAP) quickly rose to national prominence, although it is close to relatively small compared to older opposition parties.

AAP had expected that Kejriwal's release from prison would allow him to campaign as a chief minister in regional elections next month in the northern state of Haryana, and in Delhi early next year.

However, Kejriwal while announcing his resignation as chief minister at a meeting with AAP workers said he would only return to the post if people voted him back by voting for him in the upcoming Delhi election. He called on the Election Commission to bring forward the Delhi election to November, from February 2025.

"I demand elections be held in November with Maharashtra elections, I demand the elections be held immediately," Kejriwal said.

He was first taken into custody in March by India's financial anti-corruption agency, weeks before the country's national elections, in relation to Delhi's liquor policy.—Reuters

Polio vaccination becomes 'bargaining chip'

grappled by fear".

"The attackers are never brought to justice," she lamented.

These continuous attacks also lead to a surge in religious became militiamen warn people against vaccination and therefore, they turn away the immunisation teams of fear, according to officials.

Mullah Faizullah, the late leader of the outlawed Tehrik-i-Taliban Pakistan, was the first to use polio vaccination for his campaign against the government in Malakand.

At the height of militancy in KP and tribal areas in the early 2000s, he used to warn people through PM radio to not get their children vaccinated.

As a result, Sear recorded over a dozen cases in 2003.

Misconceptions and propaganda

There are a number of misconceptions surrounding the polio vaccine in Pakistan. It is one of the reasons for a vast number of parents refusing to get their children vaccinated.

The polio eradication initia-

tive started in Pakistan in 1998. Initially, the vaccines were perceived to be a "foreign plot" to reduce the population of Muslims.

In some cases, parents also refused vaccination, claiming that they weren't allowed in Islam, said Mohammad Rafiq, who supervises polio vaccination teams in Sana, Sindh Khan.

He said parents' apprehensions surrounding the vaccine have largely remained unchanged over the years.

"There are certain areas where people refuse the drops," he said, adding that misgivings about foreign donors also contribute to this attitude.

Some parents now ask why the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation—one of the biggest contributors to Pakistan's polio programme—isn't keen on vaccinating children in Palestine, as per Mr Rafiq.

He feared that this argument would only gain more currency in the near future.

The propaganda against polio vaccines has become more pronounced in recent years.

Senior Health worker

Mohsin Ali says videos on social media are one of the biggest reasons for parents' refusals.

These videos make unfounded claims about the alleged side effects of vaccines.

Bargaining chip?

Pakistan is one of only two countries, Afghanistan being the other, where the polio virus is still endemic.

Since humans are the virus carriers, the situation in Pakistan also puts other countries—which have successfully eradicated the disease—at risk.

This results in pressure from foreign donors and the government to show progress.

Over time, the masses have become cognisant of these complications and have started using vaccination drives as a tool to get their civic and social issues resolved, according to Prof Mohammad Hussain.

"Recently, even police in Khyber, Bajaur, and Bara and Lakki Marwat district beyond polio shots to get their demands accepted," said Prof Hussain, who is the president of

Pakistan Paediatric Association.

Mr Hussain, the vaccination supervisor, also said that people in many areas demand authorities to address civic issues like the construction of roads and provision of water and electricity before allowing their children to be vaccinated.

A senior official of the KP health department has conceded that opposition to polio vaccination has become a complicating issue.

The Korkhwal tributary of Khyber tribal have long been demanding the repatriation of locals displaced during military operations in the past.

Each time, they announced a boycott of the polio-vaccination campaign till their demands were met.

"These are totally political issues but have been linked with polio. Reporting polio vaccination is a big issue due to which the virus remains in the province despite these decades of efforts," the health department official told Dawn.

Administrative issues

Robina Sharif, a female vaci-

nator from Peshawar, claims that around 20,000 vaccination events are reported during each drive.

To cover this gap, vaccination ranks the fingers of children without actually administering them the vaccine, according to reports.

This discrepancy has also been pointed out by officials familiar with the polio programme. They said vaccination coverage has remained between 95 and 97 per cent on average, yet the virus has been found in sewage samples collected from 18 KP districts, including Peshawar.

An official told Dawn that these administrative issues have been brought to the notice of KP Chief Secretary Nasheed Aslam Chaudhry.

Last week, he learned deputy commissioners, district police chief and health officers to ensure proper vaccination campaigns.

Even though KP has not reported any cases of polio virus this year, Mr Chaudhry conceded that the positive environmental samples are a "ticking bomb".

Trump safe after shots fired near his golf course

FLORIDA: Republican presidential candidate Donald Trump was safe after multiple shots were fired near his golf course in West Palm Beach, Florida, on Sunday, according to two sources briefed on the incident.

The shots originated outside the fence line of the course, the sources said. Trump's campaign had earlier said he was safe following gunfire in his vicinity but gave no details.

The Associated Press reported that US Secret Service agents opened fire after seeing a person with a firearm near Trump's golf club, citing two unnamed law enforcement sources, adding that no injuries were reported.

Reuters was not immediately able to verify the report.

The Secret Service said it was investigating the incident, which occurred shortly before 2pm.

Trump was injured in an assassination attempt in Pennsylvania on July 13, raising questions about preparedness for candidates just months ahead of what looks likely to be highly contested Nov 5 election in which he will face off against Democratic Vice President Kamala Harris.

The White House said President Joe Biden and Vice President Kamala Harris had been briefed about the incident and were relieved to know that he is safe. "Violence has no place in America," said Kamala Harris, Trump's rival in November elections.

Trump's son, Donald Trump Jr., cited local law enforcement as saying an AK-47 automatic weapon had been discovered in bushes and a suspect has been apprehended, according to a post on X.

The Washington Post said Trump had been golfing at the course when the incident occurred. Secret Service agents took him to a holding room at the club, it said, citing two people briefed on what had happened.

Trump's campaign spokesperson Steven Schlossberg did not immediately respond to requests for comment.

The first shooting of a US president or major party presidential candidate in more than four decades was a glaring security lapse that forced Kimberly Clark to resign as Secret Service director under bipartisan congressional pressure.

Trump was grazed in the right ear and one rally-goer was killed in the gunfire. The gunman, identified as a 20-year-old Thomas Croom, was shot and killed by a Secret Service sniper.

The US Secret Service's new acting director said in August that he was "shaken" off a security lapse that led to the assassination attempt.—Reuters

Boat capsizes in Channel, eight die

Of 59 migrants on board from Eritrea, Sudan, Syria, Afghanistan, Egypt and Iran, six hospitalised

AMBLETEUSE: Eight migrants died on early Sunday when their overcrowded vessel capsized while trying to cross the Channel from France to England, French authorities said, less than two weeks after the deadliest such disaster this year.

A regional official said the latest tragedy means 46 migrants have lost their lives attempting to reach England from France so far this year, up from 12 in 2023.

The French and British governments have sought for years to stop the flow of migrants, who smashes thousands of boats per hour for the passage on overloaded inflatable dinghies.

A police source said the accident occurred shortly after the vessel embarked. "The toll was terrible, with eight people reported dead," regional prefect Jacques Ballot told the press, off the coast of the northern town of Amblyteuse.

Six survivors were hospitalised, including a 10-month-old baby with hypothermia, he added.

The boat had set off from the Black river that flows into the sea between the towns of Wimereux and Ardres, between France and Belgium. It had 59 people on board from Eritrea, Sudan, Syria, Afghanistan, Egypt and Iran, Ballot said.

"It quickly got into difficulty and was aground... The boat was torn apart on the rocks," he said.

Maritime authorities said that migrants had made numerous attempts to cross the Channel in recent days, with 200 people rescued in 24 hours over Friday and Saturday alone.

The latest incident comes a few weeks after at least 12 migrants, mostly from Eritrea, died off the northern French coast on Sept 3, when their boat carrying dozens of people capsized.

An Eritrean survivor Bahman Samay, 34, said he had lost his 18-year-old sister in that accident. Another Eritrean who was rescued, and gave his name only as Amarell, said "there were a lot of girls and young boys, and I saw them die".

More than 22,000 migrants have arrived in England by crossing the Channel since the beginning of this year, according to British officials.

British Prime Minister Rishi Sunak and France's President Emmanuel Macron pledged this summer to strengthen "cooperation" in handling the surge in undocumented migrant numbers.

The Channel crossings often prove perilous, and in November 2021, 27 migrants died when their boat capsized in the deadliest single such disaster to date.

French authorities seek to stop migrants taking to the water but do not intervene once they are afloat except for rescue purposes, citing safety concerns.—AFP

Historic private astronaut mission ends with splashdown off Florida

Led by Isaacman, four-member team hit a peak altitude of 1,400km

half century as they ventured into the dangerous Van Allen radiation belt.

They hit a peak altitude of 1,400km — more than three times higher than the International Space Station and the furthest humans had ever travelled from Earth since the Apollo missions to the Moon.

Then on Thursday, with their Dragon spacecraft's orbit lowered to 698km, Isaacman swung open the hatch and climbed out into the void, gripping a structure called "Skywalker" as a breathtaking view of Earth unfolded before him.

"SpaceX, back at home we all have a lot of work to do, but from here, Earth sure looks like a perfect world," he told mission control in Hawthorne, California, where teams erupted in applause.

He went back inside after a few minutes and was replaced by a second astronaut, SpaceX engineer Anna Mason, who, like Isaacman, performed a series of mobility tests on SpaceX's ship, next-generation suits.

Nine Dragon doesn't have an airlock, the entire crew were exposed to the vacuum of space. Mission pilot Peter and SpaceX engineer Mason remained strapped in throughout as they monitored vital support systems.

It marked a "giant leap forward" for the commercial space industry, and NASA chief Bill Nelson, as

well as another triumphant achievement for SpaceX.

Founded in 2002, the company has quickly outpaced its legacy competitors, now claiming as one of NASA's prime contractors — thanks in large part to owner and CEO Elon Musk's fervent drive to colonise Mars.

Following splashdown

Since completing their extravehicular activity, the crew have continued to carry out roughly 40 science experiments — for example, inserting endoscopic cameras through their noses and into their throats to image their airways and better understand the impact of long-duration space missions on human health.

They also demonstrated connectivity with SpaceX's Starlink internet satellite constellation by sending back to ground control a high-resolution video of Ghibli playing "Ray's Theme" by "Star Wars" composer John Williams, on the violin.

Polaris Dawn is the first of three missions under the Polaris programme, a collaboration between Isaacman and SpaceX.

Financial terms of the partnership remain under wraps but Isaacman, the 40-year-old founder and CEO of Shift4 Payments, reportedly poured \$200 million of his own money into leading the 2021 all-civilian SpaceX Inspiration4 orbital mission.—AFP

JERUSALEM: The Israeli military said on Sunday it was investigating after a unit dropped unauthorised leaflets on a border area in northern Lebanon ordering residents out of the Wazzani area.

The Israeli military said dropping the leaflets was an unauthorized action by a unit that had not sought appropriate approval, and that there was no evacuation underway.

Thousands of civil-

ians have already fled villages and towns on both sides of the Israel-Lebanon frontier during months of cross-border strikes, since Hezbollah movement stepped up attacks alongside the war in Gaza.

Israel dropped leaflets over a Lebanese border village on Sunday urging residents to leave, state-run media said, but Israel's military said a brigade had taken the initiative without approval.

It was the first time Israel had told residents of south Lebanon to evacuate in 18 months of cross-border fire between Hezbollah and Israel over the Gaza invasion.

The Israeli military dropped leaflets over Wazzani calling on those in the area and its surroundings to evacuate, the official National News Agency said, referring to a southern border village.

Wazzani Mayor Ahmed al-Mohammed shared a picture of the leaflets that showed a map of the region with the areas

marked for evacuation in red.

The leaflet read in Arabic: "To all residents and refugees living in the area of the camp, Hezbollah is firing from your region."

You must immediately leave your homes and head north of the Khan Younis region before 1pm (1300 GMT). Do not return to this area until the end of the war."

It added: "Anyone present in this area after this time will be considered a terrorist."

Essential services law extended to power firms

Law applies to Genexx, Discos, NTDCL; officers will have powers to order any employee to avoid going to another area without prior approval

ISLAMABAD: The government has extended the application of Pakistan Essential Services Act to all generation, transmission, distribution and sale of electricity for another six months to Jan 25, 2025 to avoid interruption in power supply because of possible cessation in the annual ongoing restructuring exercise in the state-owned entities (SOEs).

"The federal government is of the opinion that employment under all Pakistan Power Sector Entities including Distribution Companies-Discos, Generation Companies (General) and National Transmission and Dispatch Company (NTDCL), Ministry of Energy Power Division of Pakistan is essential in order to ensure uninterrupted operation of the organisation," said a notification issued by the Ministry of Interior and forwarded to all power companies.

Therefore, while using powers under subsection (3) of Section 3 of the Pakistan Essential Services (Maintenance) Act-1982 (PESA), the federal government declared all the aforementioned power companies "an essential service for a period of six (06) months w.e.f 26-07-2024", it added.

The caretaker government had applied the Act to all power companies till July. Under the law, SOEs could be described as essential services for six months.

During the intervening period, workers had resorted to protests against the restructuring that they feared could negatively impact their jobs.

The decision was taken by their federal cabinet in the second week of January on a summary moved by the Ministry of Interior on the request of Power Division. Under the decision, all these companies — Discos, Genexx and NTDCL — involved in the business of generation, transmission and distribution had been declared as essential services under section 3 of the PESA "to restrict all kind of union activities for a period of six (06) months", extendable to another six months.

The government has already decided to exclude the option of offering power companies to the provinces and is working on devolving of two Discos — one loss-making and one profitable.

The Ministry of Interior noted that currently Discos had launched a campaign against electricity theft and non-payment of dues by customers with the help of respective provinces. The monitoring of this campaign was being done on a daily basis. It is high time to check the activities of these unions, otherwise, this will bear heavy toll on the performance of Discos as well as the finance of Federation.

Ministry of Energy Power Division said in the 2023-24 financial year, it was apprehended that Discos may incur a loss of Rs559 billion, including under the head of recovery and the losses beyond the threshold set by the National Electric Power Regulatory Authority.

The PESA deals with the maintenance of certain essential services. As per section 3 of the Act, the federal government may, by notifications in the official gazette, declare any employment or class of employment for a period of six months extendable to further periods not exceeding six months. The government is of the opinion that such employment or class of employment is essential service for the purpose of "securing the defense of the security of Pakistan or any part thereof and maintaining of law and order or services relating to any matter with regard to which Central Legislature power to make laws and are essential to the life of the community".

Under the law, the authorized officers of the government have the powers to order any or all the employees to remain in specific areas and avoid going into another area without prior approval.

A magistrate has the powers under the law to try each offence summarily in accordance with the procedure laid down for summary trial in case an employee or group of employees disobeys any lawful order given to the course of such employment, or attempts to persuade any person to disobey any such order or refuse to work or to continue to work.

Special logo on CNICs to boost organ donation

ISLAMABAD: Prime Minister Shehbaz Sharif on Sunday launched a national initiative to promote organ donation, including a special logo on the identity cards of donors.

In his message on International Day of Organ Transplantation, the PM said organ donation is a "profound act of kindness that can give a new lease on life to those in need".

"I encourage all citizens to participate in this initiative and become part of a life-saving community."

Individuals who voluntarily register themselves as organ donors will have a special, exclusive logo printed on their Computerized National Identity Cards, symbolizing their commitment to giving the gift of life," the PM said in his message on the day, commemorated on Sept 16 to ensure universal access to an identity proof.

He said identity is not merely a matter of recognition, but a "statement of inclusion, representation, and access to essential services". —APP

Israel hit by hypersonic ballistic missile

Netanyahu says Houthis will pay heavy price for Tel Aviv attack

JERUSALEM: Houthis attacked central Israel with a hypersonic ballistic missile in response to Israeli strikes that killed over 4,000 Palestinians in Gaza in 11 months.

Yemen's military spokesman Yahya Saree said the military attacked Israel with a new hypersonic ballistic missile that travelled 2,040km in less than 12 minutes.

While Israel's military claimed the missile fell in an open area and nobody was hurt, Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu said the Houthis will pay a "heavy price" for the strike.

Photographers saw firefighters putting out a fire near Lod and broken glass at a train station in Modia, about 20km of Tel Aviv, after the attack.

The Houthis launched a surface-to-surface missile from Yemen into our territory. They should have known by now that we charge a heavy price for any attempt to harm us," Netanyahu said.

US failed to stop Israel, says Hamas

A senior Hamas official said that the United States was not doing enough to force concessions from Israel that could lead to a truce in the war in Gaza.

"The American administration does not exert sufficient or appropriate pressure on the Israeli side," Osama Hamdan told journalists in Istanbul. "Rather, it is trying to justify the Israeli side's invasion of our people in the Gaza Strip."

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

PSB slams NC over PFF election process

ISLAMABAD: The FIFA-appointed Pakistan Football Federation Normalisation Committee (NC) is under review now from the Pakistan Sports Board (PSB).

With the Harmon Model-like NC set to hold the provincial football elections — the second step towards holding the presidential polls of the country's football governing body — next week, the PSB has expressed its concern over the process that has been adopted.

"The PSB has received several complaints from stakeholders across football community, including clubs and athletes, raising concerns about the manner in which certain processes, particularly elections, are being conducted," the National Sports Federation Wing of the PFF wrote in a Sept. 13 letter to NC chairman Hassan Malik, a copy of which is available with Dawn.

In light of those concerns the PSB most urgent is a dissatisfaction with several aspects of the NC's administration, particularly in relation to the elections process for district football associations.

Global Football body FIFA appointed a Normalisation Committee in September 2019 after years of criticism and controversy in the PFF. It was only a few months ago that it completed the district elections, which became controversial after several new clubs were given the right to vote after an exhaustive club registration and vetting process.

The PFF letter further stated that according to Article 81(4) c of the PFF Constitution, a club must have participated in at least 90% of the matches in the District League Championship and the District Football Championship to be considered active and eligible to vote in the Annual General Body meeting.

"We request clarification on whether District League Championships and District Football Championships were organised during the NC's tenure. If these championships were not held, please explain how the participation percentages of the clubs were determined, as required under the Article 81(4) c."

Furthermore, the PSB said that NC's letter dated July 22, 2024, indicated that the elections of District Football Associations were conducted based on Article 90 of the PFF Constitution and the District Election Rules of Pakistan Football Federation, adopted by the NC on Dec. 12, 2023.

"However, the District Elections Process Overview reveals that WhatsApp was used for conducting the elections, which contradict the official voting procedure outlined in the District Elections rules. This inconsistency raises serious concerns regarding the transparency and validity of the election process," it added.

The process for the provincial elections has also come under the scanner with the NC having been accused of favouritism in its bid to get a favourable candidate elected in each of the four provinces.

The disciplinary committee appointed by the NC had slapped bars on several leading contenders for their involvement in the elections of the PFF held by the Supreme Court in December 2023, which were not accepted by FIFA.

However, last week the disciplinary committee allowed two leading candidates Syed Zahid Shah (Khyber Pakhtunkhwa) and Riaz Afridi (Punjab) to compete in the provincial elections after their appeals were heard.

The PFF also noted the focus over the National Women's Championship, where departments were barred and only clubs were allowed to compete. The tournament saw NC's favoured club Karachi City, which is helmed by Pakistan women's team head coach Ahsan Rizvi, clinch the crown.

The PFF said it had received objections from Pakistani Army's Sports Directorate regarding the exclusion of government departments from the National Women's Club Championships.

"As per Article 23 of the PFF constitution, the champion women's football team holds the right to vote in PFF congress," it added in the letter.

"With the elections scheduled in coming months, the exclusion of these departments could give rise to concerns regarding inclusivity and their right of representation."

The PFF said it expects a prompt and comprehensive response from the NC, ensuring full compliance with the PFA guidelines as well as the PFF constitution.

"The issues raised in this letter are only indicative and not exhaustive," it said. "These points serve to highlight broader procedural and governance issues, which require attention to safeguard the interest of the football players in the Pakistan."

"In the spirit of cooperation, we would also welcome the opportunity to discuss these issues with you [NC Chairman] in a meeting to resolve outstanding concerns."

Rain washes out England-Australia T20 series finale

MANCHESTER: Persistent rain meant the third Twenty20 international between England and Australia at Old Trafford on Sunday was abandoned without a ball being bowled as the series ended 2-2 square.

The match was due to get underway at 2030pm local time (1330 GMT).

However, with rain falling for several hours on Manchester on Sunday morning, both the rain and match itself were put on hold, with sleep patches forming on the covers protecting the pitch and square.

The official cut-off time for a five-wicket per side match, the minimum length required to force a decisive result, was 5040pm (1645 GMT).

But a fresh downpour shortly before a planned pitch inspection

led the umpires to abandon the match at 4030pm (1518 GMT).

The three-match series finished level at 2-1 after Liam Livingstone's 87 helped England win the second T20 in Cardiff on Friday following Australia's commanding 28-run victory in Wednesday's opener in Southampton.

England now face 50-over world champions Australia in a four-match One-day International series starting at Nottingham's Trent Bridge on Thursday.

ENGLAND CAPTAIN FOR AUSTRALIA ODIS

Harry Brook is set to captain England for the first time in the series after Joe Root's persistent calf injury ruled him out, team management announced Sunday.

Batting has not played a competitive match since defending champions England lost a T20 World Cup semi-final against India in Guyana in June.

He has been now forced to miss both the T20 series with Australia and the subsequent five-game ODI series.

Brook has only 15 caps in ODI cricket, but England already regard him as a future long-term leader, with the 25-year-old Yorkshire batsman having captained their youth side at the 2018 Under-19 World Cup.

Brook also served as Ollie Pope's vice-captain during England's recent 2-1 Test series win over Sri Lanka.

His appointment as ODI captain means England will have deployed

a new skipper in all three international formats this season.

Pope took over as Test captain from Ben Stokes when the all-rounders hamstring injury meant he missed the whole of the Sri Lanka series, with Phil Salt leading the T20 side after Brook was sidelined.

"It's going to be a great opportunity for Brook to be the captain," Root told Sky Sports. "He is a pretty laid-back character, but I think he has everything in line. He is a really good thinker about it... I am sure he'll do his own way, and he'll get a feel for those moments (in games)."

Batting, serving as an England return during their November tour of the Caribbean, said of his recovery from injury: "It's a bit slower than hoped, I'm going to be missing

the ODI series as well, so that's a shame. But at my age, I've just got to make sure I get it right... There's lots to look forward to in the future."

After England's woeful defenses of both their 50-over and T20 world titles, questions were asked over whether Brook should continue to carry the triple burden of captaining, keeping wicket and operating the bat in white-ball tournaments.

He confirmed Sunday he would not have been behind the stumps had he been fit for the T20s, following discussions with incoming limited-overs coach Brendon McCullum — already in charge of England's Test side and himself a former New Zealand wicketkeeper-batsman.

"Having spoken to (McCullum) about it, he is troubled

across it with injury preventing him from keeping wicket, but then he really enjoyed being next to the keeper at mid-off," Root said. He added: "I just want what's best for the team, what's best for the team to go as far as it can be, and if I have to move from behind the wickets to do that then so be it."

Josh Bell, the 20-year-old left-arm fast bowler who made his Test debut in the Sri Lanka series finale at the Oval earlier this month, had been due to be a member of the 50-over squad but has suffered a quad injury and will rest ahead of England's trip to Pakistan.

Livingstone, initially dropped from the ODI squad, has been recalled after two notable T20 performances against Australia. —AFP

Arteta salutes depleted Arsenal's 'ugly' victory over arch-rivals Spurs

LONDON: Mikel Arteta saluted Arsenal's hunger as the gritty Gunners ignored the absence of Declan Rice and Martin Odegaard to clinch an "ugly" 1-0 win at bitter rivals Tottenham.

Arteta's side were without skipper Odegaard due to an ankle injury suffered on Norway duty, while fellow midfielder Rice served a suspension for his red card against Brighton and Hove Albion.

But the Premier League title contenders dug deep with a combative display, benefiting from Tottenham's latest display of wasteful finishing before Gabriel Magalhaes bagged the winner in the second half.

The second-placed Gunners are two points behind Manchester City as they turn their attention to their Champions League opener at Atletico Madrid on Thursday before travelling to face Liverpool next weekend.

Arteta believes Arsenal's latest success behind enemy lines will earn them respect for a daunting week.

"We won three points in a row here. That is a big thing in the history of the club," he said.

"We had moments in the game where we had to suffer. We had to adapt a little bit because of some of the play-

ers we lost."

"I prepared for Tottenham for five days, then in one moment I lost one player and in another I lost another. I didn't sleep much. There were no excuses, no crying. The players have thick skin.

They love the game. Sometimes to win you have to do the ugly things and they love to do that."

"I loved it, because day after day the players have given and fought."

Arsenal have now won on their last three visits to Tottenham, losing just once, in May 2022, in their last eight meetings with their local neighbours.

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Zahid takes five as Markhors rout Stallions

FAISALABAD: Zahid Mahmood took a five-wicket haul to help Markhors beat Sialkot by 126 runs in their Champions One-day Cup match here at the Javed Stadium on Sunday.

The leg-spinner registered figures of 5-18 as a remarkable batting collapse saw the Stallions lose eight wickets for just 26 runs in a space of 54 balls in their pursuit of 232 runs.

An spin ruled the roost at the venue, Salman Ali Agha, too, flourished with his orthodox offspin, taking three Stallions' wickets while giving away just 21 runs.

Stallions were cruising at 70-2 requiring 153 runs from 231 balls before they lost their way as Zahid took just 4.4 overs to register his maiden List A five-wicket haul.

Pacer Nasim Shah took first two wickets as Yasir Khan was caught behind in the fifth over while Shauq Mansoor (19) off 21 charged one on in 10th over to leave Sialkot 52-2.

Rabia Aslam, the only Stallions batter other than Khan to enter double figures, looked to good touch for 45 off 44 balls accumulating eight boundaries but became Zahid's first prey in 16th over.

Earlier fast bowler Jahanzeb Khan's career-best List A figures of 4-49 and Mushtaq Mirza's 3-56 restricted the Markhors to 231 with 30 balls to spare.

Markhors were reduced to 38-2 in 8.2 overs before half-centuries from Salman (51 off 72) and Hukkar Ahmed (50 off 66) brought the momentum back to the team.

After Salman's departure, Abdil Nauman (37 off 35), free from a six and Hukkar's stand of 62 for the marksmen took the 200-run mark.

On Saturday, Usman Khan's century and Mohammad Hanan's five-wicket haul saw Panthers beat Dolphins by 50 runs. After Usman's 111 off 110 (11 fours and three sixes) helped Panthers post 328, Hanan's 5-73 ensured Dolphins were bundled out for 278 as half-centuries by Qasim Akram and Sabirullah Farhan went in vain.

Three shot over kite flying dispute

KARACHI: Three people were shot at after a scuffle among children over kite flying turned violent in Karungi on Sunday night, police said.

Workers of two political parties became involved in the petty dispute resulting in a violent clash and bullet injuries to Shan Farooq, 25, Kashif Qureshi, 30, and Ejaz Khan, 25 in Sector-48-C.

The injured were taken to the Jinnah Postgraduate Medical Centre.

The police said that a scuffle broke out between children over kite flying in which others also became involved.

Zamani Town police SHO Atiqul Rehman said it was not a "political clash" between the Pakistan Peoples' Party and Muttahida Quami Movement Pakistan, but their workers were involved in it.

He said the condition of all the injured was out of danger.

Two brothers shot

Two teenage brothers were shot in Machar Colony early on Sunday morning.

Docks police said that Sabeer Alian, 12, and Samadullah Alian, 14, were riding a motorcycle when unidentified suspects opened fire on them near Asad Mehalia.

The police said the electricity had gone out in the area at the time of the incident. The exact motive for firing could not be ascertained immediately.

The wounded brothers were taken to the Civil Hospital Karachi where their condition was stated to be out of danger.

According to Docks police SHO Nadeem Rehman, one brother sustained a bullet wound in his abdomen.

SHC acquits four policemen in extortion case

KARACHI: The Sindh High Court has overturned 10-year imprisonment handed down to four policemen by the trial court in an extortion case.

An antiterrorism court had sentenced constables Asif Khan, Muhammad Wasim, Mohammad Kashif and Babar Manzoor Chishti to 10 years in prison in March this year and also imposed fine for intercepting the vehicle of complainant Hassan Asif and his friend Shoaib Khan, forcing them to withdraw money from the ATM and extorting the same from them in November 2020 in a Gilani-e-Jasir locality.

Experts call for ROP screening to save newborns from blindness

Doctors describe

'Retinopathy of Prematurity' as one of the most common causes of childhood blindness in country

KARACHI: Born this year as Misra, Misra spent several days in a hospital incubator, fighting multiple health complications, before he got recruited with his mother.

Over a month later, he gradually developed an eye illness that doctors described as ROP (Retinopathy of Prematurity), a vision-threatening disease and one of the most common causes of childhood blindness in Pakistan.

"Being a premature baby, Misra was too weak. At the time of discharge from the hospital, the doctor advised that we should get him examined by an eye specialist," recalled Misra's father Abidur, a resident of Lyari who is associated with milk supply business.

The family reported to an ophthalmologist within a month of Misra's birth. At that time, the doctor found no signs of the illness. Misra's follow-up examinations, however, continued for at least a month till he developed strabismus.

"The news was shocking. While we were happy that the disease was timely detected, it was not easy for us to agree to the treatment." Misra narrated how the family faced the situation.

In the first phase, the treatment involved injecting both eyes with a medicine that would help reduce growth of abnormal retinal blood vessels. The second step was laser surgery for which the baby was required to be under general anaesthesia.

"I can't explain what I went through. On the one hand, the very thought of my child going blind was unbearable. And, on the other hand, I feared Misra won't be able to tolerate the effects [of general anaesthesia]."

"When I took my daughter to a senior ophthalmologist, she had already experienced 60 per cent retinal detachment," Dr

Adil said. Misra recovered.

The mother, in her 30s, had a difficult postpartum period. In addition, the private hospital in the Garden area where Misra was born did not have an incubator, forcing the couple to get him admitted to another health facility in Pak Colony. His treatment cost the family around Rs250,000.

"Despite this difficult time, we are happy today. Misra has successfully completed his treatment, actively responds to our gestures and has gained weight," Almasdullah said, adding that Misra would now continue to have periodic eye examinations for sometime.

Risk of awareness

According to experts, while Misra was able to get timely medical intervention, this is not the case for many infants in Pakistan as most parents and even doctors have no knowledge of the disease. One of them is Dr. Atta Memori.

"When I took my daughter to a senior ophthalmologist, she had already experienced 60 per cent retinal detachment," Dr

Memori recalled.

He added that she was born premature and spent almost three weeks in the incubator in 2012. "As a result, she lost one eye. Over the years, she has been treated for different complications, including vitreous haemorrhage, retinal detachment and cataract, affecting her functional eye."

The girl, now 12, has regular follow-up eye examinations. The family says vision challenges have not dampened her joyful spirit as she is an extraordinary student.

Early screening crucial

According to experts, blood vessels in the retina at the back of the eye normally finish developing a few weeks before birth. An infant who is born early is exposed to many different things: medicine, bright lights, or temperature changes and high levels of oxygen that might affect how an eye's blood vessels develop.

"ROP happens when abnormal vessels grow in the retina. If not diagnosed by timely screening it leads to irreparable retinal detachments, causing blindness."

Babies are at risk, if they're born before 30 weeks of pregnancy or weigh less than about three pounds at birth," explained senior ophthalmologist Dr. Ilyas Adil, who has been treating ROP cases for the past several years in Karachi and Sialkot where he also chairs ROP Board of the ministry of national guard health affairs.

According to him, while there is no data on ROP in Pakistan, the statistics from developed countries like the United States show that around 600 infants go blind every year. From these alarming figures, he says, one can imagine the severity of the situation in Pakistan.

"We can prevent this blindness by good neonatal care, timely screening, prophylaxis and treatment. But, the most important thing is awareness amongst healthcare providers, especially those associated with neonatal care, and paediatricians as well as parents," he said.

He said ROP might not be visible until several weeks after birth. So, premature babies are

The body was taken to the Jinnah Postgraduate Medical Centre for medicolegal inquiries.

The police said that further investigations were underway.

A policeman was found dead in his residence in Police Lines on Sunday.

The Naib Buz police said that the body of Assistant Sub-Inspector Gulam Sarwar, 50, was found from his second-floor quarters.

Area SHC Mohammed Ashiq said that it appeared that the body had lain there for around three days. He said that he was suffered from dengue fever and doctors said he died of natural causes.

He said the ASI was posted in the investigation wing of the Piscay police station and lived alone in the bachelors' quarters.

Experts call for ROP screening to save newborns from blindness

risk are usually checked by an ophthalmologist at four weeks after birth and again thereafter.

"Periodic monitoring is crucial. The disease may go on its own, but if abnormal blood vessels continue to grow, the infant's eyes must be treated," he says.

In his opinion, a major risk factor for ROP in Pakistan was improper supplemental oxygen therapy during neonatal care and lack of ROP screening.

Dr Adil Jafri reported more than 50 cases of ROP-related retinal detachment over the last five years in Karachi, mostly with unfavorable results because of advanced stage of disease at presentation.

"Parents of these children will come to an clinic, looking for any latest treatment that could cure blindness. But, unfortunately, there is none at present," he said.

About the burden of disease in Lahore, Prof Dr Mohammad Moisi, chairman of the Department of Ophthalmology, King Edward Medical University, Mayo Hospital, Lahore, said that there could be 20 to 25 ROP cases in a month at any high burden tertiary care hospital, depending on the size of its neonatal intensive care unit.

"The survival rate of premature babies has increased over the years, which explains the rise in ROP cases," he added.

The experts emphasized the need for making guidelines for ROP screening and a coordinated effort by ophthalmologists, otorhinolaryngologists and paediatricians and ophthalmologists for its implementation.

Further, training for screening for ROP and its treatment skills must be an essential part of the curriculum for the retina fellowship programme of the College of Physicians and Surgeons of Pakistan (CPSP), they said.

Mayor asked to recover losses from contractors who built substandard roads

Opposition leader Sufiuddin alleges companies responsible for poor quality infrastructure being given contracts again

KARACHI: The opposition in the City Council has reiterated its demand for an investigation into the destruction of newly-built roads during rains and asked the authority to identify and name the responsible officials and contractors and take strict action against them.

The opposition led by Jamshed Ishaq also alleged that the municipal administration was again awarding contracts of repair and rehabilitation of roads to the same firms

and individuals who were responsible for the construction of poorly built roads that damaged in first rainfall.

Addressing the meeting of the elected members, Leader of Opposition in the City Council Advocate Sufiuddin said that it's alarming that the officials who had built poor quality roads were being assigned the responsibility to build roads again.

Accompanied by Parliamentary Leader of JI in the City Council Qasim Baradaruddin, Syed Javed Nasir, Nasir Ali and others, the JI leader said that the roads and pathways done last year by the Karachi Municipal Corporation, Sindh government, DBA, and the World Bank funded CLICK at the cost of billions of rupees were washed away in recent rains.

"The CLICK had done patch work worth four billion rupees in 2023, causing a loss of billions of rupees to the national exchequer, and again tenders worth two billion rupees have been given, and five billion

rupees has been given to the KMC under the annual development program. Amid all this, no action is taken against the responsible officials, nor against the contractors. Rather the development work is entrusted to the same incompetent officials."

He said that the mayor of Karachi could not absolve his responsibility for these losses and he should bring contractors responsible for this sub-standard work to justice and the losses should be recovered.

"In determining the location of development works, the chairman of local union committees and other elected representatives should be taken into confidence, and details of completed works should be published on the website. We believe that a board should be installed on the relevant site with details of the work, and the time and date of start of work should be determined and published so that elected representatives can monitor," added the City Council opposition leader.

Two street criminals jailed for seven years

KARACHI: A sessions court has sentenced two men to seven years in prison in a robbery case.

Additional District and Sessions Judge (Lahore) Shahid Ali Mehmood accused Muhammad Sabreen and Shahzad Muhammed guilty of robbing a rickshaw driver near Hassan Square in March.

The court also awarded an additional sentence imprisonment to Sabreen for possession of an illegal weapon and imposed a fine of

Rs20,000 on him.

"The case at hand is not an ordinary one, but an offence against society. In fact, the recovery of a weapon in the mother of every crime. If, on the day of the alleged incident, the accused had not been armed, they would not have dared to pull the complainant," the judge observed in the verdict.

The judge added, "It is relevant to point out the current situation in Karachi, where many people have lost their lives and property at the hands of robbers, who always use weapons in their crimes. As a result,

the entire society feels insecure, and this sense of insecurity has a negative impact on the city's economic and social activities."

According to state prosecutor Syed Khurshid Bakhtari, the complainant informed the police that, at midnight on March 3, while driving rickshaw, two men on a motorcycle interrupted him near Hassan Square. At gunpoint, they snatched cash and documents from him. However, as they attempted to flee, the complainant hit them with his rickshaw, causing them to fall off their motorcycle. A crowd then gathered and began beating the accused. The police arrived, rescued the robbers, and took them to the police station.

During the hearing, the state prosecutor argued that the prosecution presented both oral and documentary evidence. All their witnesses, including the complainant, remained consistent, and their testimony was not undermined by the defense.

The defense counsel claimed that the evidence was contradictory. They argued that the officer who arrested the accused and the investigating officer had failed to involve private

witnesses in the case. They also claimed that evidence was recovered from the accused and that the police, to save efficiency, had fabricated the recovery of the stolen amount and falsely implicated the accused under the Sindh Arms Act by planting weapons on them.

Two separate cases were registered at the Aziz Bhatti police station under Sections 377 (robbery or burglary with an attempt to cause death or grievous hurt) and 34 (conspiracy) of the Pakistan Penal Code, as well as Section 23(1)(d) of the Sindh Arms Act 2013.

Aquatic park, calligraphy and stamps

THOSE who often wonder about Karachi's past glories usually talk about the city's colonial period. Even after independence, efforts were made to make it more urban and livable with interesting fun-seeking infrastructural development for the burgeoning population. On Sept 16, 1974, a report published in this newspaper highlighted that the Karachi Municipal Corporation (KMC) would start constructing an aquatic park at Clifton at an estimated cost of Rs6 million from the next month.

The proposed project adjacent to the already existing aquarium in the same locality, Clifton (once a famous Karachi visitors' spot), had been planned to provide recreational, educational and research facilities in marine science. Designed by a local consultant, it would include water pools, paddling pools, picnic corners, fountains, extension of aquarium exhibits, a dolphin pool,

children's amusement area with a mini rail and a shark channel. Wow! One wonders what happened to that plan!

Interestingly, while this was happening, on Sept 22, a survey painted a bleak picture of the facilities related to animal well-being in the Sindh capital only four of the more than 60 water troughs and just two of

the dozen animal sheds were in working order. On the other hand, stats showed there were a total of about 7,600 animal-drawn vehicles — tongas, victorias, camel carts, donkey carts, etc. At the time of the country's inception, the KMC was maintaining 80 water troughs and six animal sheds in its jurisdiction. With the passage of

time, troughs suffered due to neglect on the part of the municipality and their number ending misuse by a large number of people who had set up jhuggis on pavements.

On the cultural side of the Karachi spectrum, on Sept 16, the growing influence of calligraphy on the styles of Pakistani painters was brought into focus at a symposium titled "Calligraphy in Modern Art" organised by the Goethe Institut. Mohammed Ashraf began proceedings by giving a background to Islamic calligraphy using illustrations. The other speaker, the renowned visiting German scholar, Dr Anharmat Schimmel, spoke on Poetry, religion, and calligraphy: thoughts about Sadequain's work. Dr Schimmel pointed out the significant role played by imagery of letters and writing in Islamic poetry through the ages, saying, "Calligraphy is the Islamic art par excellence" whether to be used or used for ornamental purposes to preserve the mystical power of the letters. Talking about

Sadequain's art, she argued that Pakistani artists had tried to adopt a course quite different from the patterns followed by painters in Iran, Egypt, Sudan and Morocco. "Sadequain's calligraphies developed out of Quranic verses are both textual interpretation and painting, and reflect the meaning of the respective verse by their very shape."

And on Sept 17, more than 2000 stamps, post cards, envelopes with special cancellations fetched Rs1300 at the first auction of old stamps held in the city. Karachi's philatelists turned up in a large number to offer their bids for the collection of stamps belonging to the late R.B.W. Taitson, a foreign resident of Lahore. The collection was divided into various lots pertaining to Pakistan, Britain, India before and after partition. The ones related to the UK fetched the highest bid of Rs300 each.

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HIV-positive transgender dies 'due to inattention' at LUH

HYDERABAD: An HIV-positive transgender person died on Saturday night in the Liaquat University Hospital (LUH) for want of what her colleagues claimed, timely attention by the hospital administration.

According to transgender rights activist Saima Khan, Nimsa, 24, was admitted to the LUH in Jamshoro last week for a surgery as she had some wound on her hip. She said the wound developed some infection but doctors did not allow the surgical procedure and she was discharged.

Saima said that Nimsa had been an HIV-positive patient for the last four years and after remaining at home for the last couple of days, her condition deteriorated. "We shifted her to the LUH city branch on Saturday where doctors didn't pay attention to her and she died in medical unit," she claimed.

She said Nimsa needed intensive care unit (ICU) where bed was not available for her. According to Khanum, a transgender community leader, doctors said that since she was an HIV-positive patient, they would not touch her. "It is a case of sheer gender discrimination," she alleged.

LUH Resident Medical Officer (RMO) Dr Faizan said an ICU bed was arranged for the patient and it was allotted to her.

Dr Faizan also explained that patient was in a state of gaping when received at the casualty department at around 6.30pm on Saturday with complaint of abscess. "The patient was taking hormonal therapy [for breast development] and abscess was developed in gluteal region due to administration of wrong injection."

He said that she was also an HIV-positive and was given emergency treatment at casualty ward before being referred to medicine unit. He said that at around 10.30pm, one bed had been vacant in the ICU at LUH, Jamshoro, and her attendants were advised to move to Jamshoro. However, he said, they initially refused and agreed to move only after one hour of counselling.

Policemen put out shop fire in Sita Road Market

GADU: A team of policemen on patrolling duty demonstrated their sense of responsibility by extinguishing a fire, that had broken out in a shop, to stop it from engulfing the entire Sita Road Market during night hours.

Literati, civil society resolve to protect entire heritage site of Karoonjhar Hills

The protesters wore carrying banners and placards inscribed with slogans of "complete preservation and protection of Karoonjhar Hills".

Now Chakwari, Dr Nasir Kalati, Asmer Asad Parhar, Dr Murtaza Phull and other literati in their fiery speeches lashed out at the previous government for its recent decision to protect

"only 23,000 acres" of Karoonjhar Mountain Range, and not the entire heritage site.

They noted that the Sindh cabinet had directed the culture department to notify its

decision which, they said was just to show complaisance of the relevant orders of Sindh High Court's Mirpurkhas bench.

They apprehended that such decisions taken by the provincial culture

were "a step towards selling-out the granite deposits in the Kharan area and other parts of the Parkar region".

They demanded that the entire region — stretched over 200,000

acres and housing several hundred small and big hills/mountains — must be declared "protected site".

They noted that people of this region had been struggling for long to ensure preservation of the

DIG-level probe into sexual assault on polio worker in Jacobabad initiated

SUKKUR: DIG Pis Mohammad Shah of Sukkur range on Sunday initiated a thorough inquiry into the alleged sexual assault on a lady health worker, engaged in the anti-polio drive, in the Ahsan Balochi Jadduwa village of Jacobabad district five days back.

The inquiry was ordered by Sindh Inspector General of Police Ghulam Nabi Mehmood after several days of uproar on the social media and the victim's hectic efforts to ensure action against the alleged culprit along with three accomplices. She has also moved the relevant court of law to seek justice.

DIG Shah on Sunday visited Jacobabad SSP Dr Samina Noor Chauhan and discussed the matter in detail in his office.

The DIG also recorded statement of the victim and her father, besides the SHO, local media and some other officials of the Jacobabad police station.

Separately, the DIG discussed the victim's medical examination reports and

other matters with the staff of the Jacobabad Institute of Medical Sciences (JIMS).

The polio worker reportedly stated before the DIG that she was subjected to harassment and sexual assault at gun point by one man, who was accompanying his three friends. She narrated the rape and said that his associates had kept their faces covered during the episode. She said one of his associates made a video of the sexual assault with his mobile phone.

The victim's father told the DIG that her daughter's husband had naturally taken the rape of his wife as a matter of honour and disowned her. "He had taken their [the couple's] three children in his custody and asked her to leave his home," the father said, and added that an order issued by the Jacobabad District and Sessions Court, the children had to be handed over back to her.

Commenting on the victim's act of modifying her initial statement before the Jacobabad police, in which she had denied having been raped, the DIG said

the local media that "any action will be taken against anyone, may it be a police official, who may have forced the victim to hide anything".

On the polio worker's complaint of being threatened by the suspects and her in-laws with dire consequences if she proceeded with her case, SSP Chauhan told the media that he had ordered setting up of a police post outside her house to ensure security to her and her children.

While the prime suspect named by the victim has already been arrested, the Sindh police force also detained her brother, his brother and a nephew to facilitate the investigation and ensure safety of the complainant, her children and relatives.

Meanwhile, Jacobabad Deputy Commissioner Zahoor Ali Mirri has recommended to the provincial government a Rs10 million cash relief for the victim and a government job for her.

Pakistan Peoples Party (PPP) MP Haji Sher Mohammad Magheri sent a delegation comprising local councilor Asif Ali Magheri, Ali Haideri Magheri,

Bahadur Ali Magheri and others to the victim's home to assure her of all possible financial and legal support in the matter.

The delegation handed over a cash amount of Rs100,000 to her and pledged a monthly assistance of Rs20,000 on behalf of PPP.

PPP Jacobabad district president Mir Liaqat Ali Sohrai along with other officials, speaking at a press conference at Jadduwa House on Sunday, condemned the sexual assault on the polio worker.

He held out the assurance that they would continue their fight in her case until complete justice was dispensed to her.

He said he had shared all details of the case with PPP Larkana district president MMA Mir Aslam Haideri, Jacobabad, who pledged Rs1 million cash relief for her.

Jacobabad District Council Chairman Mai Tahir Khan and Vice Chairman Sardarwala Riazwan Oberi had also announced Rs200,000 for the victim, he pointed out.

Furthermore, he said, the Peoples Lawyers Forum would extend legal support to her in her case.

Govt urged to help develop Hyderabad as premier IT, e-commerce hub

HYDERABAD: Global shift towards information technology (IT) and e-commerce has transformed economy, offering a robust alternative to traditional natural resources.

Hyderabad Chamber of Small Traders & Small Industry President Muhammad Farooq Sharmin said in a statement issued here on Sunday.

Highlighting the remarkable achievements of neighbouring nations, he said India's IT exports were projected to reach \$154 billion in 2024 while China's exports were expected to surpass \$1.2 trillion. He highlighted need for targeted training and opportunities to the youth of Hyderabad and interior Sindh in IT and e-commerce, enabling them to integrate into global market effectively. He said Pakistan must adopt similar policies to foster growth of local IT industry.

He addressed pressing issue of payment security for freelancers, noting a 47% increase in freelancer income in Pakistan over recent years.

a robust digital infrastructure, he said. Additionally, the highlighted importance of creating special economic zones offering tax exemptions and incentives to IT companies. He called for modern technology courses and training programmes in educational and IT institutions to prepare students and freelancers to meet global standards.

He said the chamber of small traders & small industry was dedicated to support fully the transformation of Hyderabad into a leading IT and e-commerce hub. He said it was ready to collaborate closely with both governments and private sector to develop Hyderabad into a world-class IT business center. Metro rehabilitation project inches forward

Track outside two stations fixed, eight more to go; feeder buses for Pindi to arrive in November

RAWALPINDI: The authorities have completed the rehabilitation of the bus corridor outside two metro stations as a part of a project to rehabilitate the elevated track by the end of December.

The Rawalpindi Development Authority (RDA) divided the corridor into 20 sites – two each for a bus station – under the "Rehabilitation of Metro Corridor from Sadar to Faisalabad" project costing Rs718.945 million.

An RDA official said the work would be completed by December, adding that both sides of the Shaukat and

Khyberabad bus stations have been completed. Similarly, one side of the Wari Khan and Liaquat Bagh stations had also been completed.

According to the official, the renovation of the metro corridor and the platforms was a complicated process. He said during the day buses run on a single track while the workers carried out renovation works on the other track. After completing all 20 sites, the road will be re-opened from Sadar to Faisalabad.

The official appeared confident that work would end by December, saying the contractor had been given six months to complete the task.

"Atmospheric work is done at night, from 1pm till morning however," he said.

The RDA official said there were dire need to repair the track and platforms on the metro bus stations. However, he said that the repair work was limited to the metro track and there was no plan for the renovation of bus stations in this project.

"For the safety of buses and passen-

gers, security guards are deployed on the track to manage the buses on one lane which is opened to traffic," he said.

He said that all measures had been adopted to make the journey of passengers comfortable during the construction work and it did not reduce the number of passengers. However, he said that the speed of buses did reduce due to the ongoing work.

It may be mentioned here that the project completed in 2014 and the federal and Punjab governments almost equally shared the Rs44.8 billion project cost. Of it the Rawalpindi section cost Rs19.17 billion and the Islamabad section Rs25.84 billion.

The total length of the metro corridor is approximately 23km, including 8.6km elevated, 10km at grade, and four-kilometre tunnels.

The portion of Metro Bus Service in Rawalpindi from Faisalmi's Hotel to Faisalabad having distance of 8.6km is elevated, while in Islamabad 14.6km is

on ground, starting from Faisalabad to Park Secretariat via J.F. Road and 9th Avenue. The track has 24 modern stations for the passengers. Of these 10 are on Murree Road while 14 are in Islamabad. Sixty-eight air-conditioned buses for the service are being operated and transport an estimated 150,000 passengers daily.

On the other hand, Punjab government will launch 802 buses in the garrison city on 10 routes to connect different parts of the city with its nearest metro stations.

The feeder buses will connect all parts of the city with existing metro bus stops. The 10 routes of the buses designed to people from Pashawar Road, Adiala Road and other areas will catch the buses to Islamabad without any problem, said Regional Transport Authority Secretary Nasir Ali.

He said that the process of the buses arrival in Rawalpindi would likely to complete by November.

Surge in dengue cases in Pindi sparks urgent response

RAWALPINDI: The city's three government-run hospitals are grappling with a continuous influx of dengue patients, as 12 new cases were reported on Sunday, pushing the total number of dengue cases this season to 274.

The alarming rise in cases in September has prompted urgent measures by the Punjab government to prevent further spread of the mosquito-borne disease.

A large number of dengue patients were reported in Holy Family Hospital, Beacon Blasco Hospital and District Headquarters Hospital.

On Sunday alone, 237 patients were admitted to these hospitals. Among them, 32 tested positive for dengue fever, with 29 dengue patients landing in Holy Family Hospital, 30 in Beacon Blasco Hospital and 14 at the District Headquarters Hospital.

All the patients in these government-run hospitals arrived from 20 union councils of the

city and 20 wards of Rawalpindi and the Chaklala Cantonment Board.

A senior doctor at Beacon Blasco Hospital reported that the hospital currently had 334 patients admitted and could accommodate over 400 at a time. Six dengue patients were discharged on Sunday after undergoing treatment.

The doctor expressed cautious optimism that the number of cases might decrease in the coming month, though the current period remains critical.

The district administration,

led by Deputy Commissioner Dr Hassan Waqar Cheema, is working day and night to clear the city and cantonment from the dengue virus," said a senior official of the district administration.

He said that a third-party audit conducted by the Agriculture and Local Government departments is ongoing to evaluate the effectiveness of the anti-dengue measures and the performance of sanitary patrols.

Chaklala and Katha

Kalan union councils of the garrison city have been designated as sensitive areas due to the high number of cases. However, the majority of patients have been reported from Gohar Colony, Margalla, Airport Housing Society and New Alred Town near Gorbita.

To address the outbreak, case response activities are scheduled for 12 Rabib Areas. However, it has been decided that no anti-dengue activities will be conducted along the routes of Eid Milad processions in the city and cantonment areas.

Murree official suspended over Rs20m tax fraud

Plaza worth Rs220 million undervalued to Rs6,000 to evade taxes

MURREE: Authorities have detected a tax fraud of Rs20 million in Murree after it was revealed that a revenue official had massively undervalued a commercial property from Rs20 million to merely Rs6,000 to evade taxes.

Sources in the Murree revenue department told Dawn that the revenue auditor was immediately suspended by the Board of Revenue Member Zameen Waris after he visited the newly created district following the information about the fraud. He also referred the case against another revenue official to the authority concerned for disciplinary proceedings.

The commercial property was valued at Rs220 million as per the valua-

tion tables of the Punjab Board of Revenue, but its value was shown at Rs6,000 to avoid Rs60m in taxes.

After the on-spot inspection of the place at Mall Road Murree and after finding the report of huge undervaluation correct, [the] member suspended the revenue auditor and referred the case against the auditor Chakri Nawaz to the authority concerned," said a source in the revenue department Murree.

While quoting the member, the official said that the revenue board member was of the view that he would frequently seek information about the revenue department of Rawalpindi and Murree so that no one would evade taxes. He also directed that there should be no complaints from the public about issues, such as the transfer of property and issuance of land, and such issues should be resolved on a priority basis.

After the information came to light, the revenue board member (now) held a meeting of the divisional administration of the revenue department on Saturday and

discussed the corruption rampant in the registry branches to eliminate corrupt practices in these offices.

It is relevant to note here last week four notaries of Murree were also suspended in another alleged case of preparing documents for thousands of land of shamal communal land.

Talking about the aforementioned case of tax evasion, an official said that as per the valuation table of the Punjab government, the plaza was valued at Rs220 million. He said the price of the building in the open market would definitely be higher than the government valuation table but despite this, people evaded taxes with the help of revenue officials.

Meanwhile, a notification issued by the Deputy Commissioner's Office in Murree on September 14 stated, "Mr Nasir Mahmood, junior clerk (BS-11) working as registrar clerk, Murree, is hereby suspended from service on account of inefficiency and misconduct."

Preparations in place for Eid Miladun Nabi processions

RAWALPINDI: More than 5,000 police personnel and 454 traffic officers will be deployed to maintain peace and manage traffic on Eid Miladun Nabi, with a comprehensive plan in place for the main processions scheduled for September 17.

Cyber Traffic Police Rawalpindi has issued a special traffic plan, as two main processions will be held in Rawalpindi.

Chief Traffic Officer (CTO) Rawalpindi, Bashir Fatima said that the plan involves deploying 454 traffic police officers and women, including seven Deputy Superintendents of Police (DSPs), 63 senior traffic wardens, and 364 traffic wardens and assistants. These officers will be stationed along the designated routes of the processions.

All circle and sector in-charges have been directed to personally oversee the traffic flow and ensure that it remains uninterrupted during the festivities.

A special contingency plan will be in effect for emergency vehicles, including ambulances and fire brigades, to guarantee their timely access in case of emergencies, CTO Bashir Fatima stated.

In addition to traffic management, more than 5,000 police officers will be on security duty. This includes over 450 officers specifically tasked with overseeing traffic arrangements. Security arrangements will cover 108 processions, with 2,400 officers assigned to the main procession and more than 2,600 officers designated to secure the remaining 107 processions.

CTO Syed Khalid Hamdani outlined additional security measures, including the installation of walk-through gates at procession entry points, full-body searches for participants, and deployment of snipers on rooftops for enhanced security. Steps and routes along the procession paths will be sealed, and police from all local stations will perform security and patrol duties in their respective areas. The authorities are committed to using all available resources to ensure foolproof security throughout the Eid Miladun Nabi celebrations.

Woman killed in road accident

RAWALPINDI: A housewife was killed while another woman and her daughter were injured when their car crashed into a truck on Motorway near Chakri on Sunday.

Initial police report suggested that a doctor, his three-year-old daughter and a housewife were heading to Islamabad from Sargodha in their car when it crashed into a truck, resulting in the death of housewife Aasma Bibi, 32. The doctor, who was driving the vehicle, and her daughter were injured.

According to Rescue 1029, shortly after the accident happened, two emergency vehicles with four crew members were sent to the scene to shift the victims to the hospital.

Initial reports, quoting the statement of the survivor, suggested that the driver fell asleep and crashed her car into the truck.
